While darkness has sometimes been used as a negative foil for light ... our scripture and assembly song is filled with imagery in which the darkness is filled with the glory of God" (Sundays and Seasons, Year C 2022).

As the Calendar year nears its end, the Church's year begins anew in Advent as we wait for the Christ child and the coming of the Lord. All are welcome to join us this Advent for midweek worship at 7 pm as the Duke Lutherans lead a contemplative service of word and prayer. Although each week will highlight a unique theme and Scripture passage, all of

the services will be woven together by simple, meditative music, dimmed lights and candlelight, moments of silence, and artwork depicting the interplay of light and darkness.

Week 2, Dec. 8: Darkness is Beautiful (Song of Solomon 1:2-6)

Week 3, Dec 15: Darkness Holds Promise (1 Samuel 3)

The calendar year is winding down and I can't believe it is time to write the December newsletter article. This also means it will soon be time to write the year end report for the congregation's Annual Report. For those of you that participate or lead groups within the church, please make a decision on who will write your report and plan to submit it right after the New Year.

Advent devotional books will be available beginning the week of November 21st.

As we begin Advent and plan for the upcoming Christmas season, I want to make you all aware of some changes to the schedule this year.

First and foremost, we will hold three (3) Christmas Eve Services. The 4 pm will again put emphasis on the children, with gift bags, the retelling of the Christmas story and a service of Holy Communion. We will for the first time in a couple of years, host a 7 pm and 10 pm worship with Holy Communion. We will stream and record the 7 pm worship and are working on a brass ensemble and hope to have some members of the choir sing.

Unfortunately, we will not be producing a Children's Christmas program this year, but my plan is for this to be the last year that this is the reality.

We have once again secured funding for the Vicar program for 2022-23 academic year, thanks to a gift from one of our members' family foundations. This is a blessing.

Sunday, December 26th will be our annual Lessons and Carols worship. We will also move the Epiphany service from January 6 to Sunday, January 9. I know the January announcement is premature, but wanted you to be prepared to join us for this service of light and hope.

Please watch for the Angel Tree at the end of November. Once again, the Women's Connection is working with Parktown Food Hub this year and securing gift cards for families and children in need. Thank you ladies.

I give thanks for the faithful that continue to gather at St. Paul's and those that watch the service online. We are blessed to stay connected in these difficult times.

May the God of peace, grant you all a measure of God's peace this season.

From the Vicar...

This past month, Pr. Amanda and the Duke

Lutherans invited me to join them on a Pilgrimage of Pain and Hope here in Durham. The pilgrimage, hosted by DurhamCares and Duke Chapel, was a weekendlong intentional journey through much of the pain African Americans and other racial minorities have experienced in our city. We started Friday evening at Stagville plantation, one of the largest that existed in the country, to learn about and stand on the ground where so much suffering and horror happened to the thousands of enslaved persons that were brought there. Of those thousands, less than four people are known to have escaped. Saturday was spent walking through downtown Durham, visiting sites like M&F Bank, the Carolina Theatre, and NC Mutual Life Tower to see where African Americans fought for their rights and strived to build a better life for themselves, their families, and their community. As we heard from local leaders and heard their stories throughout the afternoon, I began to see and experience the hope and joy that existed in the midst of all their pain and hardship.

Christmas can be a mixture of these two experiences for us, joy and sorrow. Despite our festive decorations, jolly carols, and lots and lots of cookies, the Christmas season can bring back grief for families who have lost loved ones. those who live alone or are separated from loved ones by distance feel that separation just a little bit more acutely. But the message of Christmas is that our God chooses to experience all of these things with us by becoming truly human. When we remember and celebrate the Incarnation of Jesus this Christmas, our joy and praise will be as much about a God who lives and feels our own pains, suffering, and loss as it will be about the coming of our promised Savior. The incarnate God that is Jesus was and is with the African American community of Durham just as Jesus is with each of us here and now in our own lives and hardships. I do not know why God doesn't just rid the world of everything that causes hurt. But we do know, and we do have hope, that we are not alone in our God who chooses to be with us, Emmanuel. And certainly, for that, we can say Thanks be to God!

Finance Committee Update

As the Church fiscal year winds down, I am taking this opportunity to update the congregation on our financial position as of the end of October. We have received \$481,514 in pledges, loose offering, use of the church, and other sources of income to date. Even in these challenging times, giving has been close to what we estimated when the budget was approved last December. However, a higher level of giving was projected for the last two months as in years past to achieve a total income of \$603,923. We will see if that happens.

Expenses to date are somewhat under what we predicted at \$481,785 and almost match income. Hopefully, income and expenses will continue the same trend and we will end the year without spending more than our income. As chair of the finance committee, I do urge you to review your 2021 pledge and fulfill it, if possible, by the end of the year. On behalf of the Finance Committee, I thank the congregation for their continued support of St. Paul's ministries.

Dialogues on Race Study Group

The NC Synod has provided a curriculum for a

seven-week program called "Dialogues on Race" and encourages members of St. Paul's to form small study groups to explore it. In January 2022, the Continuing Conversation Group will post sign-up sheets, we hope that you will join us as we start this study in March. This Bible-based curriculum is designed to foster reflection, communication, and insights; there are also creative exercises to help us imagine strategies and tools to use after the study period has concluded.

Each participant will have their own copy of the study curriculum with short readings to review for each week. Two CCG members have already attended the Synod training for facilitators; if more than ten people sign up, we'll form two groups with a facilitator leading each one.

To quote from the introduction: "It's not news to anyone that we are living in a time of conflict, division, and disagreement. We are at risk of becoming 'stuck' in an 'us-versus-them' divide." Come join us as we learn to listen to all perspectives, honor our fellowship as brothers and sisters, and work toward ways to build bridges across any divides during this challenging time.

Look for sign-up sheets in January; the course lasts seven weeks; each meeting will take between 60 and 75 minutes, preferably in person. If you would like to review the curriculum in advance, please send a note to Bee Ellertson or Alta Lindsay. We hope you'll be able to study with us and help us grow together in faith and community.

As a lay person you don't need theological knowledge or education to give the most important sermon feedback. Honest feedback given in the spirit of helping the Vicar learn is vital. You are more than qualified, you are most important when teaching the Vicar to be a great preacher and pastor. You may use the formal sermon evaluation form available from Vicar Mac or just email your comments to the Vicar.

Council Corner


