Brooklin's Mackenzie Beam said of her participation at the world U19 Lacrosse Championships, "An incredible experience. One of the best things I've ever been a part of. Representing our country was just so special."



How to train your teenager

Question: You want your teenagers to learn responsibility and money management skills. Do you:

a - Give them a weekly allowance and hope for the best?

b - Show them how to shop for bargains, no matter the price? c - Buy a chip truck and get them to run it?

Answer: For Bill Dashper, the answer was an easy decision. He picked c.

Dashper, himself an independent businessman who does network cabling, bought a chip truck last November from a local fellow who'd had it stashed at the Ultramar gas station on Winchester Rd., west of Baldwin. He named it The Tragically CHIP Wagon to honour his favourite band. In fact, when you visit it and this place deserves a visit you'll hear only Hip music on the outside speakers. If you examine the background to the menu closely, you'll see a poster of Hip concerts Dashper attended, including the momentous final one on Aug. 20, 2016.

"It got to a point where my daughter (Isabelle) kept asking for money for clothes and such," he recalls as this writer awaits his own fries order. "This is crazy. She needs a job,' I thought."

Taking the leap

So he took the leap. He brought the wagon up to speed on fire and safety codes and taught Isabelle, now 16, how to cook fries, poutine, hot dogs and burgers (he'd done some small order cooking as a youth at a golf course). What he hadn't counted on was just how much extra work there was for him.

"That was one of the challenges," he says. "How quickly things run out. I've made more trips to Costco in the last two months than in my life, and I've been a member since 2001. Some weeks, it's three or four visits for ketchup or napkins or fresh lettuce. The margins in this business are razor thin."

And potatoes. Bags and bags of potatoes.

Aside from Isabelle, he has two sons, Jack, 14, and Fletcher, 12, who are obviously CHIP-sters in waiting. While Isabelle handles most of the workload, Dad hired additional help for other shifts. In fact, the biggest chunk of expenses lies in staffing. He's occasionally had to step in to fill shifts.

Developing skills

"I told my kids they'll have a big leg up on their friends because they'll have developed all these great skills." The two boys can't yet do the cooking but it seems Fletcher has natural people skills "at the window," as the industry calls it.

Meanwhile, Isabelle admits she's learned a number of new things.

One is to only use stuff when absolutely necessary. She's become fastidious about waste. The other is to ensure health code and safety procedures are followed assiduously. And here's a bonus: she's been in French immersion her entire school life, first at Brooklin Village and now at Donald Wilson Secondary. If you care to order in French, or at least practice it, she's more than able to converse.

Oil changes

Bill Dashper says the one thing they've addressed that might have caused an issue was to change the oil every Saturday morning to ensure freshness. So if you order on a Friday, he explains, your fries may

have a slightly darker hue as the oil reaches the end of its lifespan. They're still good though (as this writer will attest to the requested extra crispy).

The Tragically CHIP Wagon accepts cash or debit and will stay put through the fall. Bill is pondering how to keep it open through the winter as well as researching a way to text ahead for your order to avoid the wait. On the horizon of course is the massive construction to take place on the land behind the Ultramar which, he figures, could prove to be very lucrative. By that time, Jack and Fletcher will be able to join their sister in the new family venture.

Brooklin Heritage Society The Medland's Store By Jennifer Hudgins



To the Medland family, every day at their store on Campbell Street was an adventure. From the constant stream of customers, to kids passing by on their way home from Meadowcrest School who would stop to play with the kittens and eat lollipops, Medland's was a place that fostered a sense of community. The scent of feed sacks and molasses hanging in the air, John would warmly welcome each customer and take the time for a chat, making sure to ask about their lives and families.

In 1987, when Barb began to work full-time at the store, she and John would carry out heavy sacks of seed and water softener salt to customers' cars. It was not just a business; at Medland's, everyone felt like family.

John Medland, "the feedman," was born on October 27, 1927. His wife, Jean Gimlet, a Columbus farm girl, was born on January 19, 1932. The couple married in 1953

and John took over the family business at W. J. Medland and Son Ltd. when his father, Bill, retired. John and Jean had two children – a son Bill and a daughter, Barbara.

As a lifelong resident of Brooklin, John was a life mem-

ber of Mount Zion Lodge, A.F. & A.M. 39 Brooklin G.R.C. and a recipient of the William Mercer Wilson Medal in 2007.

In 1996, Medland's made music history the day the Tragically Hip set up their instruments on the loading dock and filmed the song 'Ahead by a Century'. Much Music Video Awards went on to choose it as its 1996 Best Video.

In, the spring of 2013, Brooklin experienced a huge loss when W.J. Medland and Son Ltd., its oldest business, finally closed its doors. On April 16, 2017, John passed away leaving behind a legacy of customer service that could never be replaced.

The Brooklin landmark was recently commemorated by artist Jody Edwards in a painting depicting the store in its heyday, keeping it forever alive in the town's collective memory.

Whitby Meets With Provincial Government On Priorities

A Whitby delegation led by Mayor Don Mitchell recently met with provincial Ministry leaders on local issues of importance, including the impact of growth and removal of tolls on Highway 412. The meetings took place during the 2019 Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) Conference held August 18 to 21 in Ottawa.

Meetings were held with Minister of Infrastructure Laurie Scott, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing Steve Clark, and Minister of Transportation Caroline Mulroney, as well as with New Democratic Party Leader Andrea Horwath.

A delegation led by Deputy Mayor and Regional Councillor Rhonda Mulcahy also met with Deputy Premier and Minister of Health Christine Elliott regarding the need for a new hospital.

Key asks from the Town included:

Changes to the regulations set out in Bill 108 (More Homes, More Choice Act) to ensure that growth and essential services are not compromised;

Help to improve traffic flow and the transportation network in it's don't worry so much about what Whitby, particularly through the removal of tolls on Highway 412, lease or ownership of Baldwin Street (from Winchester Road East to Brawley Road West) to the Town, and reduction of tolls on Highway 407;

Funding support for a new, full-service hospital for Lakeridge Health in Whitby; and,

Consistent and predictable funding and grant programs to support the development of growthrelated municipal infrastructure, such as a new North Whitby Sports Complex.

"As a Town, we are committed to making Whitby the best place to live, work, play and visit," said Mayor Don Mitchell. "Partnership at all levels of government is critical to enabling us to continue to build the kind of community we all love to live in. Provincial support of these four priorities will make a true and positive difference to Whitby and its residents."

Dinnertime with vegans

If I could give one piece of advice to people who invite vegans for dinner,

you're serving.

This summer, I've been to dinner parties and cottages and it seems to cause the host (ess) a lot of stress. I love people, so just being invited makes me grateful. The last thing I want is for someone to worry about it. After all, food is the side dish to an event. I'm okay just to eat vegetables (unbuttered) and salads, and if you want to grab a premade vegan burger from the store, then that works, too.

Thinking I need a burger or a single source of protein on my plate as a meat replacement is not how I eat anymore. Sometimes I just use brown rice and veggies as my protein source or a combination of hummus, raw vegetables, and salads. I rarely even think about protein. When I ate meat, every meal started with whether or not we were going to have beef, chicken, or fish, and how it was to be prepared. As a new plant-based eater, I did focus on a bit of protein but now I just eat a variety of foods. My needs are covered.

Here are some tips to make your plant-based dinner less stressful for

- Honey is not vegan, which might seem silly, but hardcore vegans won't eat it. If a recipe calls for honey, it can be replaced with agave nectar or Maple Syrup.
- · Dairy (cheese, butter, milk, and yogurt) is not vegan, but vegetarians do eat dairy. If doubtful about whether or not your guest will eat it, place the cheese on the side and

people can add it to their salad or meal.

- Fish and seafood are not vegan.
- Most bread is vegan, but not all. Check the label as occasionally eggs are used as a binder in buns and bread.
- Being vegan does not mean we're gluten-free. Some people think they are synonymous. In fact, gluten is the protein in wheat and is therefore plant-based.
- Store-bought salad dressings can be tricky as some contain honey as a sweetener. Farm Boy, for instance, has dressings that aren't full of preservatives and a few don't include honey.
- There are many premade burgers or "chicken-less" nuggets. Eaten in moderation (as they are generally highly processed), they will make life easier for you when you're hosting. I had the new Beyond Meat burgers this summer and enjoyed them.
- I love tofu. Lots of people tell me they hate it, but I eat it all the time. Last week I went to a friend's cottage, and they barbequed seasoned extra-firm tofu slices. They were delicious. Always use extra firm tofu for cooking and grilling as it holds together well.

ers can count on DRT to help them do more and drive less throughout the Region," says Regional Chair John Henry.



A Hospital in Brooklin?

This is a real possibility.

Last week I represented Whitby as part of a delegation with the Deputy Premier and Health Minister of Ontario, Christine Elliott. We met at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) Conference in Ottawa where I was given 15 minutes to plead the case for a Durham acute care hospital to be located on our Whitby site.

Christine Elliott and her late husband, Jim Flaherty, had represented and lived in Whitby for many years until the last provincial election. She is quite familiar with the municipality. So it's less challenging to sell something when both sides of the table are familiar with the subject.

I began by stating, "I'm going to try to temper my enthusiasm slightly because I am so excited about how great a site we have for the hospiťal."

The Town has 45 acres on the south side of the 407 on the west side of Baldwin, a site that will be serviced by the new mid-block road for which the Town is currently doing an environmental assessment.

We mentioned numerous other key factors that make this site attractive for a hospital:

Proximity to the 407 & 412

- Proximity to Ontario Tech University and Durham College
- Walkable to existing amenities including practitioners, pharmacies and health centres
- · Walkable to historical downtown Brooklin
- On the trail system into Heber **Down Conservation Area**
- Access to transit
- · Proximity within the fastest growing town in the fastest growing region in Canada.
- Located in the heart of Durham with easier access to health care for ALL Durham Region Municipalities while relieving the pressure off Scugog and Uxbridge Cottage Hospitals.
- Whitby is an innovative municipality with rapid growth in the high tech industry.
- A talented local workforce.
- · Ready serviceable land that is already approved in the Municipal and Regional Official Plans as a Health Precinct.
- Location adjacent to our future north Whitby sports centre which

also allows for collaborative recovery in health care and the possibility of district energy.

We really do stand out as the ideal pick in Durham Region.

If chosen by Lakeridge Health as the preferred site, that recommendation would be sent to the Province for further acknowledgement. But I do wish to emphasize that, no matter where this hospital is located within Durham, it is needed and will get my support. This isn't a battle among municipalities; this is a community need that is largely acknowledged. I defer the decision to the health care professionals, as it should be, because regardless of where it goes, it will serve our residents better.

After a site is chosen, the real work begins. We will be expected, as a Region, to fundraise millions of dollars as our commitment to the building of the hospital, indeed a massive campaign. As well, it will take more than 10 or possibly 20 years to build, depending on how fast we raise the money.

But first thing's first. Will Brooklin be named as the site? I hope so. Then again, I am admittedly a bit biased.

Demand for Home Ownership has not Diminished

"Month over month we continue to see strong home sale growth in Durham Region.
