

It has truly been and honor and privilege to serve the American Legion Auxiliary this year. The Department of Arizona has proven it is the best in the West. Arizona has continued to shine and make sure it has carried on this year's goal to "Make a Brighter World for our Veterans". We have done this through the dedication and passion of our members. There is so much information on activities and auxiliary involvement that would take many pages to report it all. Therefor, highlights of this year, in no order will be reported.

One of the most exciting events was the visit from on National President, Kathy Daudistel, in March. Arizona has been combining all our goals to serve. President Daudistel 's Caring For those who Care For Others, Our Department theme of Building Awareness and Education for PTSD, and team building with our American Legion and Sons of the American Legion have all contributing to strengthening our organization. Member started slow but were fast to catch up and reach our membership of 100%.

The different programs overlapped to serve our veterans, families and communities. Members volunteered at shelters, food banks, VA hospitals and each holiday. Some small Units were limited by their size so special projects were made. Unit 11 in Douglas has worked with the Veterans Commemorative Project and members of Post and Unit have supported this display with volunteer hours and donations. A new project for Unit 11 was making cards given to family members of deceased veterans and handed out their funeral homes saying, "Hail and Farewell to another Veteran lost. Our Sincere Condolences. Please accept this Poppy as a remembrance.

Units participated in blood drives and Unit 26 filled every spot allocated by the Red Cross. Unit 27 did outstanding Community Service all year long collecting items for the Globe Fire Animal Rescue and Paws and Claws and processing over \$60,000 worth of coupons to send to bases overseas. Unit 35 collected over 20,000 lbs. of food and water and established a local food pantry to allow veterans or others from the community to receive immediate assistance when the need arises. One member has organized an Annual Agent Orange Awareness event to raise money and awareness. The town of Gilbert lights up the Gilbert water tower in orange in honor of our veterans affected by Agent Orange. Units adopted families during the holidays to ensure they had food and clothes.

Education covers a tremendous area and strong feelings for 'putting it out there". Education is emphasized in making sure all areas of our programs are covered. This includes scholarships awards by the different programs such as the nursing scholarships from Past President's Parley. Education was a focus of our department. Education was presented at Mission Training Leadership workshops, holding creative arts to promote healing for our veterans, Flag Etiquette ceremonies, teaching the importance of our Constitution and By Laws and the legislative

process. All our programs for children and youth carried the importance of education. JROTC in the local schools covered education as well as national security. Auxiliary members also encouraged our Junior members to participate and be part of reading and mentoring programs at local schools. The Samsung Scholarship was stressed as part of the ALA Girl's State program.

Auxiliary members have done great work and have taken the role of building and developing strong relationships in the community through positive social media, Ring Your Bell ALA Arizona, monthly newsletters or bulletins and booths at local community events. Unit 62 was able to stream their Veterans Day event with the help of Centennial High School film department. Units also have used promotional materials such as jewelry, cups, slap ons and magnets for getting a conversation started on "Who we are and What we do".

This year's special project was to promote an awareness and understanding of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and how it affects our veterans their families and our communities. The Department of Arizona opened its heart and mind to support the PTSD Foundation of America. Members held fund raisers, workshops, family support groups and have raised money to support new chapters in Arizona.

Auxiliary members continued their work during the COVID pandemic and once able to restart they have had the desire to do even more. American Legion Auxiliary members practice that they have learned and know that their light will remain. We strongly believe in this saying:

District 11 had a successful year.

- District 11 held 6 meetings with representation from no less than 7 Units attending each meeting.
- District 11 organized a mission training session, graciously hosted by Unit 105, where over 30 members attended. Thank you, Cindy Queen, Stacey Mayberry and Rose Fickin for a fun and informative session!
- Unit 62 hosted Department President Jennie's official visit to District 11 where 25 members attended. In
 addition to reimbursing her travel expenses (\$175), District 11 raised just over \$100 in personal donations for
 her special project (PTSD Education and Awareness).
- All District (and Department) mandates were paid on time and District 11 came in under budget, despite having trimmed the budget extensively.
- Several housekeeping activities were completed including:
 - o replacement of the missing Kathryn Thomson plaque
 - o painting and labeling of the District Flag bases and eagles
 - o removal of female pronouns from District 11 Governing Documents
 - o adding the option for District Secretary and Treasurer to be two positions in the Governing Documents
 - o making permanent the option for members to attend District 11 meeting virtually
 - o putting District 11 Governing Documents on a thumb drive for the Department satchel
 - o putting all 2021-2022 official documents on a thumb drive for retention purposes.
- The District 11 PPP Fundraiser hosted by Tina Ganados/Unit 61 was a great success raising over \$900 for Department Health Care Scholarships. District 11 used some of its under-budget funds to round the donation up to \$1,200.
- The President's Fundraising basket raffle program was a success with Units reporting raising more than \$500 from the donated baskets. (Units received up to 5 free raffle tickets for every member attending a District meeting. Each meeting a ticket was drawn for a basket that the winning Unit would use to raise funds).
- More than \$150 of District 11 50/50 proceeds were redistributed back to the Units via the President's Fundraising basket program.
- The HEAL HER Art Veteran Outreach program was piloted through District 11. Units 29, 53 (who held 2 sessions), Unit 62 and District 11 participated. Over 20 women veterans participated, compliments of HEAL HER Art, while Units had fun and raised more than \$1000 for their programs. District 11 held an event where women veterans could bring a child and ALA members could bring a Junior member to paint side by side. District 11 paid for the Junior members with its under-budget funds.
- Together the District made its membership goal! Special recognition to Units 29, 61,62 and 105 for exceeding their goals.

No words can express the privilege to serve as District 12 President and just how I have been humbled to have met the wonderful members in the seventeen Units that embraced the "Making a Brighter World for Our Veterans" spirit that embodies District 12.

The year began at the Organizational Meeting at Post 35. After a two year drought caused by the Covid 19 pandemic members were ready to get back to business. This President adopted a new approach to mentoring; the goal was to promote ALA programs. Each Unit was asked to name a Mentor to suggest topics for discussion at monthly meetings. This President introduced "Bob" the Minion, an inquisitive/eager member with goal – to become a productive, positive Auxiliary Member. Bob visited many functions serving as an unofficial ALA Ambassador.

They also participated in Fall Conference. Department President Jennie Molina made her official visit at the November meeting.

Americanism was stressed in all Units. Members distributed small flags in schools. Also, the Pledge of Allegiance comic books were given to children. Flag Etiquettes Books were made available to local teachers, Boys and Girls Scouts. Units participated in 9/11 ceremonies honoring First Responders. They honored Veterans Day, Memorial Day and Flag Day. Units honored Blue Star and Gold Star Mothers.

Units contributed to the Auxiliary Emergency Fund by holding fund raisers and raffles.

Children and Youth were included. Units support local schools by volunteering in libraries. Members held Halloween, Christmas and Easter parties for youth. They raised funds for abused children, handicapped youth programs, Boys and Girls Clubs. Units support military kids programs.

Units in District 12 were involved in local community programs. They held fund raisers for homeless families, food banks, held toy drives for underprivileged youth, purchased school supplies for special education programs, donated clothing for children in shelters, and participated in Christmas projects. They volunteered at senior center centers, in hospitals and local churches, donated to cancer research.

Units reviewed their Constitution and By Laws and made decisions to amend By Laws/ Standing Rules.

The Education program was stressed in the District. Units provided awards for local schools. Junior Auxiliary members participated in reading and mentoring programs in schools. Units donated to scholarship programs. The Samsung Scholarship was stressed as part of Girls State program. District 12 Units sponsored local youth at the Oratorical.

Finance was important by making all Units aware that they must file 990's with IRS. The importance of having a Unit Budget was highlighted. Units were reminded that to file State Incorporation paperwork.

Girls State, the premier program of the Auxiliary, is an enormous part of the District. Units sponsored local high school juniors for this program. The District held an Orientation to educate parents and delegates about the ins and outs of this program.

The juniors program is a huge part of District 12; juniors volunteered in local schools, community programs and veterans programs.

Districts 12 held a Mission Training seminar and are busily applying all skills learned in this session. Members were eager to learn about the auxiliary, protocol and generally – how to run a meeting.

The Legislative Program was supported in District 12 with Chairmen urging members to become more involved in the election process and legislation that involves all veterans' causes.

Music was a part of District 12 success. Units sung patriotic songs at their Post functions.

Membership was huge this year in District 12. As of this writing, nine Units are at 100% or more, four Units with over 90% and all Units are busily working to 100%. As of May 15 District 12 has 4947 members, sitting at 106.25%. Kudos to District 12 for working Membership goals.

National Security is important to District 12. Many Units supported JROTC and included local high schools in their programs by presenting awards to outstanding students. Units participated in block watch programs, held blood drives.

New Units and UD&R is a big part of District 12. Units are truly involved in revitalization.

Past Presidents Parley is vital to District 12. Several Units have active parleys that contribute to Nurses Scholarship and Women Veterans. District 12 continues to support involvement in fund-raisers to contribute to the nurse scholarship program.

Presidents Special Project information was shared at the September meeting by a visit from the Department Chairman who provided an overview of PTSD Foundation. Units threw their support by holding fundraisers and donating to her special project.

Public Relations information was shared. Units had articles in newspapers promoting Auxiliary programs. Units posted flyers in their Posts announcing Auxiliary programs, ie. Girls State Orientation, Children's Holiday Parties, 9-11 ceremonies, Veterans Day Programs at local cemeteries, Memorial Day and Flag Day ceremonies. Many Units contributed to "Ring Your Bell", a social media outlet on Facebook.

The Poppy Program is a huge part of many Units. They promoted the program by selecting a Miss Poppy to represent their Unit. One Unit promotes the Poppy by visiting their local City Council Meeting in May and distributes poppies to all in attendance. Members used poppies for table decorations, Christmas tree themes, and corsages.

VA&R, what can be said? District 12 members were involved with countless hours assisting Shockwave, DHEP and other local veteran-nonprofit organizations. They were there for the Creative Arts, Veterans Assisting Veterans, taking Veterans to the doctor, providing comfort items for hospitalized Veterans, and participating at Gift Shop in December.

These activities are a sample of Auxiliary programs in District 12. This year was an effort for a new normal and I would like to give a big THANKS to all Units, Officers and Chairmen; no one will ever take away from the joy and love that I have experienced as District 12 President. Each and every one of you educated me, humbled me. You are the greatest and "Bob" and I were so proud to be there for you.

Children & Youth Book of Reports

The American Legion Auxiliary Department of Arizona Children and Youth program was a huge success statewide. 41 units provided year end reports on their C&Y activities for the 2021-2022 year with a total of 9,191 volunteer hours, a total of \$64,356 spent, and estimated helping over 5,640 children and youth.

Based on the narratives provided, most units worked with the local schools to provide back to school supplies, participated in the "Give 10 to Education" project, worked with the JROTC programs at the local schools. Many units assisted the families at Luke Air Force base located just outside of Phoenix with Christmas gifts, school supplies and clothes and Thanksgiving meals. One unit noted hosting a Harvest Celebration for children, youth & their families and distributed materials to educate children on water, electrical, helmet, gun and child seat safety.

Many units hosted events to teach students how to fold pocket flags as well as to explain the meaning of each of the folds. Those pocket flags were then included in the "Boxes for the Troops" projects for deployed service members.

Despite the pandemic restrictions, many units still hosted events and were still able to maintain the CDC safety regulations including events for Halloween, Christmas in July, Veterans Day, and Easter and was a successful program.

Keeping in mind the National President's theme of "Caring for those who Care for Others" and the Department President's theme of "Making a Brighter World for our Veteran's

The Department of Arizona's National Security program for the year 2021-2022, promoted a strong national defense in support of military service members, and their families.

Despite the ongoing threat of the pandemic, unit members used their resources to donate 2240 hours and \$4,043.78 to the Children and Youth Program.

Several units sponsored events honoring Gold Star Families, by sending wreaths to the family to honor the fallen. Unit 41 in Phoenix reported participating in "The Piestewa Fallen Heroes Memorial. A 2-day event honoring the family of Lori Piestewa, the first Native American woman killed in the war in Iraq. A member of the Quartermaster Corps, she died in the same Iraqi attack in which fellow soldiers Shoshana Johnson and Piestewa's friend Jessica Lynch were injured. In attendance at the event were POW'S Jessica Lynch, Edgar Hernandez, Joseph Hudson, Patrick Miller, and James Riley. Shoshana Johnson was not able to attend. Blue Star families were also recognized by hosting dinners and providing them with Blue Banners.

Unit 35 and the entire Post family, from Chandler, Arizona participated in a delivery dinner to honor First Responders as part of the Patriots Day Ceremonies. As in past years, honorees included police, firefighters, EMT's and 911 personnel. Not to be forgotten with virus challenges Auxiliary members cooked a dinner that included dessert and all the fixings that were delivered to both Chandler police and fire fighters.

Throughout the year Unit members were encouraged to wear red shirts on Fridays to "Remember Everyone Deployed". Yellow Ribbons were worn at various unit events.

Unit members identified Veterans, and Service Member Families who were in need assistance and stepped forward delivering food boxes to military installations where they could be distributed to the families.

Apache Unit 27 in Apache Junction, cut coupons, made lap robes, and collected toiletries for the troops still actively serving overseas. They sent over 20 care packages to include playing cards, hygiene products for both men and women, and lots of goodies. Included in the care packages 400 hand-written note cards by the children of the local school, Brinton Elementary, each with an American Flag affixed to them. These boxes will be hand-delivered to "Packages from Home" for delivery to the troops.

This year the Unit added a "Bones from Home" box in the lobby so all members could bring in items needed for K-9 dogs.

In addition, Units in the community acknowledged servicemembers and veterans by supporting with practical and tangible services, such as yard work, social calls, childcare, cooking meals, sending get well and thinking of you cards all to let them know they are not forgotten. Community Service Book of Reports 2021-2022

The American Legion Auxiliary members of Arizona provided many hours of their time and money to assist various people and organizations throughout the State of Arizona even through the pandemic. The members are proud of their accomplishments in serving their communities. Out of the 85 Units in Arizona, 48 units reported back.

Members are busy volunteering at shelters, food banks, Veterans Commemorative Project, VA Hospitals, Fisher House, MANA House, schools, Veterans Community Centers, House of Hope and in the community at large.

Unit 11 in Douglas, AZ has been hard at work at the Veterans Commemorative Project. The Veterans Commemorative Display is located in the historic Gadsden Hotel in Douglas. One member has spent countless hours keeping it going as it exists through donations and grants. With the help of more volunteers, this year it was open for extended hours to serve those visiting from afar. One member has donated over 800 hours for this project. Douglas is a very patriotic community; members of Post and Unit have supported this display with volunteer hours and donations from The American Legion Family. As schools began to open, the display was able to organize school tours. This display is a must for visitors.

Unit 11 started a new project this year of making up cards to be given to family members of deceased Veterans. The cards are maded out at the funeral homes and presented to families with a poppy at the funeral saying, "Hail and Farewell to another reternal lost. Our Sincere Condolences. Please accept this Poppy as a remembrance."

Unit 108 is participating in Prescott Valley's new Adopt a Park program. The mission of the program is to protect and enhance the town of Prescott Valley's local parks, trails, and art pieces with ongoing volunteer support. A sign will be posted by Parks and Recreation recognizing Unit 108's commitment to keeping the park clean.

Unit 6 of Prescott focuses its' time on many areas of Community Service. Unit 6 members cook and deliver meals to the US Vets Foundation, transport veterans and family members to doctor appointments, shopping, church, and meetings. They held fund raisers for many events including Presidents Special Project, Stand Down, Cancer Research, Holocaust Survivors in Prescott, and PTSD Awareness along with many others.

Unit 26 held a Blood Drive. Members were able to fill every spot allocated by the Red Cross.

Apache Unit 27 continue to provide Community Service all year long. Unit 27 collected items for the Globe Fire Animal Rescue and Paws and Claws rescue, helped with Church rummage sales, helped coordinate a blood drive, collected, clipped, and processed well over \$60,000.00 worth of coupons to send to bases overseas. Unit 27 made donations to the Starbright Foundation, which helps victims of trafficking. They speak at schools, businesses and anywhere someone wants them to come to educate the community about what to look for regarding abuse, grooming and sexual abuse. They work with the local Genesis Project which provides meals to the homeless.

Unit 109 coordinated and hosted a Community Recognition Day along with other entities of 109, where they invited the community along with all local first responders to join them for the day promoting the American Legion Auxiliary and showing the community what we are about. Another activity 109 participates in is POW-WOW (Produce on Wheels- With out Waste) it is a monthly program that brings fresh fruit and veggies for bulk purchase to anyone in the community. (70 lbs for \$12) Volunteers from Unit 109 sort thru the produce and load it into vehicles. Every Saturday, over 200 cars are processed through.

Unit 32 in Safford continues its work with The House of Hope, a halfway house for males. Unit 32 members helped with a local cat rescue, volunteering to catch, transport and care for the cats that were either strays or unwanted. One such member who has fostered numerous cats, transports them from the area caught and ensures veterinarian appointments are kept and then helps with transportation to Tucson by either going or providing a vehicle for transport.

Mathew B Juan Unit 35 works year-round to exemplify its service of community, state, and nation. Unit 35 has a biannual event to collect food and water for Mathews Crossing Food Bank. In 2021 Unit 35 collected 20,000lbs of food and water. Unit 35 also established a local food pantry to allow veterans or others from the community to receive immediate assistance when the need arises. One of Unit 35's members hold an annual Agent Orange Awareness event to raise

money and awareness. This member gets the town of Gilbert to light up the Gilbert water towers in Orange in honor of our veterans affected by agent orange.

Many Units participated in community beautifications. Several of the small towns take pride in their clean up days. In addition to community beautification, plastic bottles and cans were collected; the money was used for various programs.

Units held community-wide drives for toiletries, personal care items, cards, games and munchies so care packages can be sent to seployed troops. This includes drives to send Girls Scout cookies to the troops. Many holiday cards were handmade and signed for air deployed Servicemen and sent overseas.

Several Units adopted families during the holidays. Many children had a nice Christmas thanks to the generosity of Post families.

Many Units hold school supply drives. Paper, pens, pencils, rulers, disinfecting wipes, hand sanitizer, tissues, scissors, crayons, colored pencils, and other supplies are collected from members. Post families donate to the fund and Auxiliary members do the shopping.

Wayne V McMartin Unit 91 holds many fundraisers during the year. For Easter, Unit 91 and 91 entities worked with Operation Easter Bunny to put over 300 easter baskets together for kids of all ages in shelters and hospitals. Some members crocheted many beautiful baby blankets and hats for the baskets. Unit 91s President was recognized by the Chandler Unified School District as an outstanding volunteer at Hartford Sylvia Encinas School for all of the Units hard work and donations. Unit 91 along with all 91 entities donate twice a year to Mathews Crossing Food Bank. This is a huge fundraiser with over 30,000lbs of food donated in 2021 alone. Unit 91 sends out an annual letter to all members asking for donations for their Poppy drive. This has had huge success. Unit 91 sets up booths at local restaurants and at the Chandler Ostrich Festival to hand out Poppies and talk to the public about the ALA mission.

Unit 6 in Prescott held rummage and bake sales. They help family members get to doctor appointments, shopping and running errands. Unit 6 members donate their time at the information desk at the Prescott VAMC. Members also volunteered at the blood bank and VA Pharmacy along with many other places. They assisted in Kids Vision USA and at the Creative Arts Festival along with many other volunteering opportunities.

John J Morris Unit 62 ran with President Kathy Daudistel's theme of, "Caring for those who care for others" along with Arizona Department President's theme, "Making the World a Brighter Place for our Veterans." Members donated a total of 12,159 volunteer pours along with donating \$39,603.00.

Flag raising ceremonies were held on Memorial Day, July 4th, Veterans Day, and Pearl Harbor Day by Unit 62. Unit 62 in Peoria, donated to many charities including Heal Her Art program, Soldiers Best Friend, elementary schools, food banks, and other charities. Unit 62 has been remarkably busy in the community despite COVID restrictions.

During the COVID-19 outbreak, Unit members made masks and delivered them to the VAMCs. They also handed them out to members of the community who needed them. Members are checking in on those that cannot get out. Members are shopping, running errands and doing anything that they can including making phone calls and checking in with their members. It is truly heartwarming how much outpouring of love and kindness is being shared.

EDUCATION Year-End Report 2021-2022

Despite the continued presence of COVID-19 with restrictions preventing visits in many classrooms again this school year, many Arizona Auxiliary Units managed to raise funds to assist our schools and students. Districts and Units received information regarding the Education program at the Department 2021 Fall Conference and Bulletins were included with the Department newsletters mailed out each month.

There were no mid-year reports required this year. Thirty-four Units completed year-end reports and reported 623 Auxiliary members, 72 Junior members, and 146 Legion members were involved. Sons of the American Legion and Legion Riders also participated this year.

Several Units delivered Thank-You cards and treats to teachers and staff during *Education Week*. Juniors from two Units hand-made Thank-You cards for the bus drivers and school crossing guards also. One Unit treated teachers to breakfast, and presented them with Appreciation Certificates and door prizes.

Two Units provided snacks to bus drivers during National School Bus Safety Week.

Almost all Units participated in the *Give 10 to Education* program by providing a number of school supplies and educational materials such as backpacks, pens, pencils, crayons, glue sticks, notebooks, face masks, hand sanitizers, etc. A Unit donated backpacks for Children of Veterans and another Unit provided school uniforms. Riders from a Unit donated a flag and \$100 for school supplies. Cleaning supplies were also provided to a few schools. School supplies were provided to the Homeless Children's program and a Cub Scout Troop. One Unit donated an entire pallet of hand sanitizers to local schools and charities which was supplied by a local grocery store.

Several Units donated items to stock a school pantry and needy children received clothing and essential items.

A Unit provided Flag and Poppy education at a School Resource Fair. Another Unit delivered flags and books on flag etiquette to a school. Books were collected and donated to schools and a local library.

Riders held a "Ride for Love" and donated \$300 to a child with an incurable disease.

Several Units provided food baskets and/or Gift Certificates to needy families at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Units also participated in the Luke Air Force Base Operation Kids and provided items for the children. A Unit sponsors a needy family at Christmas each year and provides each member with a gift and funds for a holiday meal.

Veterans assisted six Units with ""Veterans in the Classroom" program. They helped teach Flag etiquette, how to fold a flag, flag burning, and the military alphabet to students at several schools. Students made displays of what they learned and Veterans reviewed them with students and staff.

Unit, Post, and SAL members presented awards to JROTC members at their annual awards dinner. Another Unit informed a local high school of volunteer opportunities and recruited several JROTC cadets to volunteer at events and with clean-up.

Legionnaires assisted the Auxiliary by coordinating with Boy Scout Troops on their Eagle projects. The Scouts learned about the importance of service and citizenship. One Unit sponsored a Cub Scout Pack and donated mini flags, backpacks, and school supplies.

A Unit promoted Girls State at a Career Fair. Five Units will sponsor a total of 32 delegates to Girl State: two delegates, four delegates, five delegates, six delegates, and 15 delegates, each respectively.

One Unit participated with clean up teams on Make A Difference Day.

A Unit also donated to Spirit of Youth, Children's Miracle Network, Special Olympics, and The American Legion Baseball.

Fourteen Units reported the award of 53 Unit scholarships totaling \$23,680. Units raised funds for scholarships by holding dinners, raffles, sales, etc.

Department and National Scholarships were promoted in school classrooms, Unit meetings, and Unit newsletters. The Department of Arizona offers the *JEAN BATLEY PLAQUE* for Units with membership of 150 and under and the *CHRYSTEEN FRITZINGER PLAQUE* for Units with membership of 151 and over. The purpose of these awards is to stimulate interest in good participation in the American Legion Auxiliary Education program by giving recognition to the Unit which makes the most use of the available ideas in education, scholarship, and loan possibilities. The plaques will be presented at Department Convention to the Unit whose chairman submitted the report which best describes the promotion of the program. Four Units submitted narratives for these awards.

Department received one application for Junior Member Loyalty Scholarship. The application was forwarded to the Western Division Education Chairman for consideration and it was then submitted to National. The Winner will be announced at Department Convention.

Members of the Department of Arizona recognize that our children require a good education for a successful future and are devoted to contributing to their success.

We appreciate all who participated in The American Legion Auxiliary Education Program and helped our schools, teachers, children, and parents in so many ways.

Thank you, Madame President Jennie Molina, for allowing me to be part of your year of Service to Veterans. It has been a rewarding experience.

One Hundred Eighty-four, young women from one hundred-forty High Schools throughout Arizona were scheduled to attend American Legion Auxiliary Arizona Girls State at the University of Arizona in Tucson from June 5-11, 2022. Thirty-nine Units reported some form of Girls State Activity.

Forty-eight Units sponsored one or more delegates to attend the 75th session. Thirty-five Units did not sponsor or contribute. Nine High Schools without Unit representation sent delegates. These numbers are **down** from previous years.

You name a way to make money...members of the Auxiliary did it, to generate the funds needed to sponsor each delegate. Because of today's economic conditions, many Units needed contributions from other organizations, persons and agencies. Legion Posts, Junior Groups, Legion Riders and SAL Squadrons gave donations to support the program.

Again, major focus was placed on a standard Orientation with everyone receiving the same information through a power point presentation. Orientations were most successful when Units notified the delegates and **alternates** to attend. Because the last two years Girls State was virtually presented, it was most importance that Orientations for delegates and their parents/guardians were held to get latest information out and questions answered.

We are missing a membership opportunity by not asking delegates if they are eligible to become a member of the Auxiliary. Information on the Samsung Scholarship was sent to delegates again this year...to apply you must be a **DIRECT** descendant of a Veteran. Were girls asked?

Three Units submitted an entry for the **Yvonne Granger Plaque** and it was a hard decision for the judges to make. Girls State publicity was from local newspapers that covered the events as daily doings and from the Girls State website.

Units rewarded contributors with certificates, plaques and thank you cards. Several Units reported returning the money paid by the Delegate if they attended Girls State and reported back to the Unit.

Two pairs of white tube socks were requested from each Delegate as a Community Service Project. These socks will be divided among the VA Medical Centers, Veterans Homes, Veterans Homeless Shelters and standdowns.

The Girls State Yearbook is a success and we will be taking orders again. We will continue to promote enrollment for Girls State Alumni Association and "Friends of Girls State". This helps with funding of the two scholarships that are awarded each year.

REMINDERS: The political workings of the Department should not be a part of Girls State. The Units work within established Girl State guidelines and policy. This makes it fair for all schools and Units. Allotments and schools are changed each year to accommodate enrollments and bed capacity or Unit problems. Units should not decide or tell other Units what they should do. **ONLY SPONSOR** of Girls State is the American Legion Auxiliary. All **OTHERS** are **CONTRIBUTORS** to the program. Payment with one check and notarization of parent signature greatly improved. We still need to work on completion of forms, cards with pictures, school signatures and especially Unit certification. Application and media paper on each Delegate must also be returned.

We still need to work on the March 1st deadline. You don't have to wait until March to get started as packets are sent to school around January 15th each year. This year many Units did not contact schools or become involved. Many schools non participation was due to no Unit involvement. Hopefully we can work on this for next year.

We thank each of you for your **dedicated service and assistance** to the Girls State program. We more than appreciated that when asked to help with extra schools or delegates or take on other responsibilities, you were willing to do so for the program. We also appreciated your thoughtful contributions over the required fees.

There will be a Girls State update at Convention. FLASH...FLASH! Who will be elected Governor and Secretary of State at the 75th session? Who will be the Girls Nation Senators going to Washington D.C.? Who will receive the Samsung Scholarship? Until then...Look to Girls State and you'll find...tomorrow's leaders of mankind. LEGISLATIVE 2021 – 2022

At the end of the 2022 year, the Department of Arizona had 35 out of 86 Units actively working the Legislative Program. There were 12 Units that had nothing to report but reported to the Chairman. One Unit did not work the program but sent in a report stating such. Out of the 35 reports, only two included some type of narrative. Out of those two, only one met the guidelines for an award. None were sent after the May 1 deadline.

The committee educated members in the legislative issues promoted by the American Legion, by sharing with members in the Department Monthly Bulletins upcoming legislation the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary supports, how to find polling locations, and newly elected officials and their contact information. Information was also shared on social media.

There was one special legislative meeting held, but the Unit that held the meeting did not provide further information. There were no legislative rallies held. There was one reported town hall meeting held by Congressman Paul Gosar. There were no Units that held a "Meet the Candidates Night". Two Units promoted and discussed the Dispatch at meetings and in emails. Twelve subscriptions were reported as being purchased.

There were 374 letters sent to US Senators, US Representatives, State Officials, Local Officials, and the White House. There were 200 other contacts with US Senators, US Representatives, State Officials, Local Officials, and the White House. There were 123 replies received from US Senators, US Representatives, State Officials, Local Officials, and the White House. Several Units and Posts also have members that are State and Local officials.

Members connected and made contact through phone calls, letters, and emails. Members discussed their concerns and issues they faced. Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic with government restrictions, many Units had to contact their elected officials via phone calls, letters, and emails rather than in person visits and meetings.

Units in the Department promoted and supported women veterans by donating funds to charitable organizations, encouraged women veterans to join the Auxiliary with paid memberships for the first year, held luncheons and sponsored Heal Her Art events. Units in the Department made sun hats for women veterans with the branch they served on the hats, recognized them at meetings, special events, in newsletters, and on social media. They also supported women veterans by helping homeless women veterans in their area.

Twenty Units promoted voting, by telling members how important voting is and to get out and vote. Units made calling lists for members that needed rides to polls and provided information in online newsletters. Members helped distribute and put-up yard signs in local elections. Members also worked at polling places and helped members that needed assistance filling out mail in ballots. Units also held voter registration sessions.

Several Units participated in government and civic education by starting a Facebook page for the Unit, distributing pocket flags and flag books to students at a local elementary school. Counselors were educated about Girls State. Several members from one Unit attended a local school board meeting. One Unit promotes an after-school civics club. Several Units attended JROTC awards banquets. Due to ongoing COVID restrictions and CDC guidelines, many other Units are still not allowed into the schools.

As mentioned before, several Posts and Units have members that are Local and State officials. Many have been keynote speakers at special events.

In March members from the American Legion Department of Arizona and the American Legion Auxiliary Department of Arizona Legislative Chairman were to attend the National Conference in Washington D.C. Due to COVID restrictions, the conference was cancelled in person and held virtually once again. The only member allowed to address Congress, was American Legion National Commander Paul Dillard

Department of Arizona Auxiliary members continue to advocate for veterans, active-duty military, and their family's rights.

NATIONAL SECURITY

BOOK OF REPORTS 2021-2022

Keeping in mind the National President's theme of "Caring for those who Care for Others" and the Department President's theme of "Making a Brighter World for our Veteran's

The Department of Arizona's National Security program for the year 2021-2022, promoted a strong national defense in support of military service members, and their families.

Despite the ongoing threat of the pandemic, unit members used their resources to donate 2240 hours and \$4,043.78 to the Children and Youth Program.

Several units sponsored events honoring Gold Star Families, by sending wreaths to the family to honor the fallen. Unit 41 in Phoenix reported participating in "The Piestewa Fallen Heroes Memorial. A 2-day event honoring the family of Lori Piestewa, the first Native American woman killed in the war in Iraq. A member of the Quartermaster Corps, she died in the same Iraqi attack in which fellow soldiers Shoshana Johnson and Piestewa's friend Jessica Lynch were injured. In attendance at the event were POW'S Jessica Lynch, Edgar Hernandez, Joseph Hudson, Patrick Miller, and James Riley. Shoshana Johnson was not able to attend. Blue Star families were also recognized by hosting dinners and providing them with Blue Banners.

Unit 35 and the entire Post family, from Chandler, Arizona participated in a delivery dinner to honor First Responders as part of the Patriots Day Ceremonies. As in past years, honorees included police, firefighters, EMT's and 911 personnel. Not to be forgotten with virus challenges Auxiliary members cooked a dinner that included dessert and all the fixings that were delivered to both Chandler police and fire fighters.

Throughout the year Unit members were encouraged to wear red shirts on Fridays to "Remember Everyone Deployed". Yellow Ribbons were worn at various unit events.

Unit members identified Veterans, and Service Member Families who were in need assistance and stepped forward delivering food boxes to military installations where they could be distributed to the families.

Apache Unit 27 in Apache Junction, cut coupons, made lap robes, and collected toiletries for the troops still actively serving overseas. They sent over 20 care packages to include playing cards, hygiene products for both men and women, and lots of goodies. Included in the care packages 400 hand-written note cards by the children of the local school, Brinton Elementary, each with an American Flag affixed to them. These boxes will be hand-delivered to "Packages from Home" for delivery to the troops.

This year the Unit added a "Bones from Home" box in the lobby so all members could bring in items needed for K-9 dogs.

In addition, Units in the community acknowledged servicemembers and veterans by supporting with practical and tangible services, such as yard work, social calls, childcare, cooking meals, sending get well and thinking of you cards all to let them know they are not forgotten.
