

In the 20th century, Marietta's mother died when she was just 6 years old and she and her sister were sent to Duquesne, Pennsylvania to live with an aunt and her family... From DC or Maryland:

Take 410 (East West Highway) west to Jones Mill Road. Make a right onto Jones Mill Road. Take Jones Mill Road until the name changes to Stonybrook Drive.

You will pass a Manor Care Nursing Home on the left....you will pass the Audubon Nature preserve. After you pass the Audubon Center, you will cross a bridge. Soon you should see the spires of the LDS Church on your left. Drive past the church until you see the Family History Center—the red brick building.
