PART II: Meeting the Students of St. Anne's Girls Secondary School in Damongo, Ghana!

Three SIGP members (Kerri Green, Carol Hofer, and Rosanne Morrow) recently traveled to St. Anne's Girls Secondary School (SAGISS) that the club supports in Damongo, Ghana.

The club, along with other donors, provides tuition support for 6 girls each year. The tuition is \$500 per term, and with 3 terms per year, the grand total is \$9,000. The school consists of three grades, which are referred to as: Form 1, Form 2, and Form 3. This is the standard in Ghana for high schools.

SAGISS is a boarding school, which is also common in Ghana. I consider this to be a good thing for the students because attendance is more regular. Girls are not distracted by having to take care of younger siblings, the harvesting season, or other family obligations that could limit their schooling. The girls often live far away from the school, and only go home for breaks between terms. Transportation can be difficult, expensive, and time-consuming. Multiple times we experienced the trip on the dirt road from Damongo to the school as an eternity even though it is only 4.3 km (2.6 miles)! It is so bumpy, rough, and dusty, and it takes about 20 minutes to cover it. The potholes in Michigan are no competi-

tion for the terrible road conditions all

over Ghana.

Since SIGP has been supporting this school for six years, we also had the pleasure of meeting some girls who had already graduated thanks to our support. They came back to Damongo to meet us and express their gratitude. We had a nice group dinner so we could get to know these young ladies.

Francesca (2019 graduate) currently

works in an office (typing, making copies, etc.). She wants to become a teacher and hopes to start training school next year.

Rejoyce (2019 graduate) currently lives with her family locally in Damongo and hopes to attend teaching school next year.

Agnes (2018 graduate) lives in Tamale and is taking an additional mathematics course. If she receives favorable results on her math exam, then she will begin training to be a midwife.

Patience (2018 graduate) lives in Abuesi, about 5 hours south of the school. She plans to take an additional mathematics course in 2020 and wants to study to be a nurse.

As for our club's six current students, we have two in Form 2: Jennifer and Helen, and four in Form 1: Sylvera, Prudence, Hilda, and Hanifatu.

I sat by Prudence at dinner, and we had a nice conversation. She lives with her mother and younger brother in a small, rural village far away from the school. (Her father is deceased.) Coming to SAGISS in September was the first time she had ever left her village. At this time, Prudence hopes to become a nurse at a hospital.

I will admit that when we first met students in Ghana, I was very awkward with them. I had trouble finding things to talk about. "What are your hobbies?" Most teenagers have chores and responsibilities and very little free time.

Life is about survival, and is vastly different from the packed schedules and extra-curricular activities of American teenagers. Sports aren't common, except for football (what we call soccer), and I found that it was mostly played by boys. "Where did you go on your last family vacation?" People in rural Ghana may never even leave their village, so they certainly don't travel for pleasure. I finally landed on asking students if they had siblings. Everyone could tell me about their brothers and sisters, and if they were younger or older.

Also, music and dancing are wildly popular, so I often asked students if they could play an instrument. I was in awe at the variety of musical talents these girls had with singing and cadence, especially during church services and the traditional dances they greeted us with on the first day. You can see by the photos what a wonderful experience this was.

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
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
POSITIVE IMAGES (PI)



Bette and Diane Kashuba began with a 3-minute thought-provoking word: SHOE. (Really... that was the word!) The women wrote anything they could think of about SHOEs and then, if they wanted, shared what they wrote! How simple it was to make the group comfortable!

The topic for the day was ADOLESCENCE which is always a hot topic as adolescents can be difficult! The session ended with an ornament given to each woman.

Hats off to Bette, Diane and Dorothy Wasinger who are the mainstays for PARENTING and to Jane Lightfoot and Ellen Chapin who volunteer when they are in town.

JOURNAL WRITING at Positive Images

Nancy Solak is again offering a four-week writing workshop at Positive Images this month. Women who live in the Coplin residential center volunteer to participate in this safe and peaceful space. The sessions are called, "Hear My Voice!"

The clients along with Ms. Nelson (the staff member on duty who shares her love of writing with Nancy) write in response to a prompt and then share their writing with the group. Nancy, a certified instructor of the Amherst Writers & Artists method, reports that the women are creative, wise and supportive of each other.

An example of such a prompt was the day Nancy brought a small vase filled with Forget-me-Nots from her garden. Placed in the middle of the table, the group was asked to respond to the following prompt: I will never forget ...

Each person, including the facilitator, silently writes about their response. Those who wish read their writing aloud. After each reading, the others give feedback on what struck them about the writing style or the content itself. Feedback on the workshops is pretty consistent: "I love this class!"

Consider one-on-one or even group mentoring in your community. There also are opportunities to mentor youth across the country through online or e-mentoring programs.


