Medical care is free, including surgeries, prostheses, wheelchairs, walkers, orthotics or whatever the child needs, Fitzsimmons says.

Eneyda Guadalupe "Lupita" Montes first visited the clinic at age 2, with feet so deformed that doctors determined she would never walk. They recommended bilateral amputation below the knees and prosthetic legs. Lupita returned home from a successful surgery but refused to walk on her prosthetic legs. She returned to the clinic where doctors and therapists still could not persuade her to walk.

That day, Father Ed Gustafson, executive director of the clinic at that time, had one of his dogs with him. The dog licked Lupita on her cheek and walked out of the room. Up jumped Lupita and followed him.

"She has been walking ever since," Fitzsimmons says. "She is a beautiful, 12year-old sixth-grader and loves riding her bicycle."

Donations to the clinic cover the costs of X-rays, laboratory tests, prescriptions, orthopedic devices and hearing aids for the children.
