Hazzan's Notes

Dear Friends,



Now in the month of July, we begin our summer sojourn of travel and relaxation in these normally hot days. This month I will be traveling to 3 countries where Jews have lived for hundreds, if not thousands of years.

Italy has been a home for Jews who left the levant (Israel) for thousands of years now. The *Nusah Roma* or Jewish traditions of Rome have been in place there since ancient times. They are one of the Jewish communities that uses the organ and a male choir in worship with the Rabbi/Hazzanim since very early times. Today, the Chief Rabbi of

Rome, Ricardo da Segni, has a wonderful relationship with the Vatican and the Pope which was recently renewed under the new Pope, Leo XIV. The clergy of the Great synagogue in Rome is headed by the impeccable Rabbi/Hazzan Alberto Funaro, whose loud and clarion voice has been a fixture of the community for many years. The Tuscan Jewish communities in Pisa and Florence have grown more Sephardic in practice in the 20th and 21st centuries. The synagogue in Florence is one of the largest in the Tuscan area. The Venice Jewish community dates to the Middle Ages and was the first place Jews were placed in a ghetto which is where the word was born. The community boasts 5 synagogues of which 2 are in regular use to this day and their traditions are similar to but somewhat different than Rome.

Malta has boasted a Jewish community for hundreds of years. Though today it is a much smaller community than it has been in the past, the Maltese Jewish community is vibrant and resides mostly on the main island of the island chain. It now only boasts one synagogue, and its clergy are Orthodox. There are @100 Sephardi Jews on the main island at this point.

Montenegro was part of the Yugoslavian community of groups and nation until 2006. Now it is an independent Balkan nation. There is a Jewish community in Montenegro, and it is estimated to have around 400 to 500 members. Judaism is also recognized as the fourth official religion in Montenegro.

I will have much to report back to you in August on this trip!

Whether you stay in town or travel, I hope you take the time to relax and find new Jewish communities and entities to see and learn about and from.

Synagogue (Shule)

The synagogue became a second home to the Jews. When Jews moved to a new town or community it was the first institution they built. The synagogue has served the Jews in times of happiness and times of tears. The rich and the poor, the teacher and the student, the young and the old, all found an opportunity to associate with each other and work together for the benefit of the community.

Throughout the generations, to the present day, the synagogue has served to unite in spirit the Jews in the entire world. It speaks the language of the Jew. You see that within its walls no Jew is a stranger.

<u>Laws of the Service</u> Minyan. In order to conduct a public service whether in Shule or at home, there must be at least 10 Jewish people present. To be counted one must be 12 for young woman and 13 for men. This quorum is called a minyan. The special memorial prayer Kaddish can be recited only when there is at least a minyan. Also the reading of the Torah scroll may take place only when there is at least 10 people present that are of the Jewish faith.

When conducting a service it is necessary that the minyan be present in the room where the service is taken place. If some of the people are in a nearby room they may not be counted in the minyan.

<u>The Cantor (Hazzan)</u> The reader of the service, is considered a person of importance. Our sages tell us that the Hazzan should be chosen wisely. They should be G-d fearing. They should understand the prayers they recite. Above all, they should realize their responsibility as a representative of the people before G-d.

Our Rabbi taught me that there must be friendship and cooperation for a synagogue to function properly. The Hazzan for his service should be appointed by the Rabbi or the president of the synagogue.

Beth Shalom of Whittier will be moving its service broadcasts from Facebook to YouTube beginning with the broadcast of services on **May 9, 2025, at 7:25 pm**. Here are the simple steps to view services from Beth Shalom of Whittier on YouTube starting that date:

You do not have to sign up or subscribe to YouTube to watch our livestream services or videos on it!

On any computer browser, type in the top search bar: https://www.youtube.com/@BethShalomofWhittier then hit Enter on your keyboard. That will take you to Beth Shalom of Whittier's You Tube Channel!

The first video icon there on our video channel will be the one you want to click on and watch. We will generally have a video icon set at least 20 minutes ahead of the service broadcast time and it will begin at the noted time (7:25 pm, 9:25 am, etc.). You can click on that icon and wait for the video to start.

Chat Feature on YouTube

Should you wish to use the chat feature on a YouTube livestream, you must have a Gmail email address and password and sign into YouTube at the top right of the YouTube screen where it says **sign-in**. If you do not have a Gmail address, you can create one by clicking on that sign-in at the top right of the YouTube first page and following their instructions. Then each time you watch a livestream you can sign into YouTube and the chat feature will be on the right side of the video you are watching.


BOOK CLUB NEWS
