



The April-May issue of the NYS Conservationist reports that everyone knows of the "partridge in the tree" but a-much rarer "bird" is a carp in a thornapple bush. This spring in the State's Conservation Department Game Management area at Visher's Ferry on the Mohawk River, a large carp was found stranded in the bush. High water during the spring break-up surged through the area carrying big fish into tree snags, many five and six feet aloft. NOTICE TO USGLI AND NSLI POLICY-HOLDERS - If you permit your policy to lapse before its anniversary date this year, it will mean that you have been overpaid in your 1961 dividend.

Dividends are calculated to the anniversary date of the policy, although payments of dividents for 1961 are being paid in advance because of Executive Order. Policies lapsing after the dividend payment but before the anniversary date will be overpaid, and the VA will recover through liens against the policy, benefit payments or the matter will be referred to the General Accounting Office for recovery.

NEW YORK STATE CONSPICUOUS SERVICE CROSS: This is a silver meal issued by the State of New York to veterans who were residents of New York State at time of entry into the Armed Forces and who received a citation in connection with being awarded one of the following ecorations: Medal of Honor; Distinguished Service Medal; Legion of Merit; Silver Star; Distinguished Flying Cross; Soldier Medal; Marine Medal; Navy Cross; Bronze Star Medal; Air Medal; Purple Heart. If you are eligible contact me.

NSLI DIVIDENTS: A special GI insurance dividend amounting to \$230-million is expected to be paid some 5-million GI policyholders. Veterans who still have their GI insurance may expect to receive this special dividend during July and August. The dividend will average about \$46 and is being paid to help the National economy.

NEW RULES ON WEARING LEGION CAP

The new cap etiquette laid down by the National Executive Committee of the American Legion, as approved by resolution, requires all Legionnaires to remove their Legion caps while eating. It is not proper to wear your Legion cap while eating a meal at an official Legion or civic luncheon or dinner.

The Story of the Stars and Stripes

(Continued from the May Issue)...(Have you been showing or reading this bit of precious history of OUR FLAG to your kids?)

EARLY AMERICAN FLAGS

The First Stars and Stripes

The Stars and Stripes, whose birthday we observe on June 14, was created on that date in 1777, when the Continental Congress resolved: "That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternately red and white, that the thirteen states, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." The first Army flag had the stars arranged in a circle, presumably based on the idea that no colony should take precedence. The First Navy Stars and Stripes, flown by the man-a-war Guerriere when she sailed from Boston on July 25, 1818 for Cowes, England, had the stars arranged in staggered formation in alternate lines and rows of threes and twos on the field of blue. However, on September 9, 1818 the Board of Navv Commissioners received a directive from President Monroe that "the Flag of the United States shall conform to the pattern, herewith transmitted, viz: tweny stars in a blue union, and thirteen stripes, red and white alternately, according to the Act of Congress passed on the fourth of April last; of which you will please to give due notice to the Naval Commanders, and the necessary directions for making the Flags.

Fifteen Stars and Stripes

Following an Act of Congress on Jan. 13, 1794, this was the flag of our Country from 1795 until 1818. The addition of the two stars and two stripes came with the admission of Vermont, March 4, 1791, and Kentucky, June 1, 1792, into the Union. This type of flag figured in many stirring episodes. It inspired Francis Scott Key to write the "Star-Splangled Banner"; it was the first flag to be hoisted over a fortress of the Old World, when Lt. Presley N. O'Bannon, of the Marine Corps, and Midshipman Mann of the Navy raised it above the Tripolitan stronghold in Derne, Tripoli on April 27, 1805; it was our ensign in the Battle of Lake Erie; and was flown by General Tackson at New Orleans. Fearing that too many stripes would spoil the true design of the flag, Congress passed a law on April 4, 1818 returning the flag to its original design of thirteen stripes and providing for a new star to be added to the blue field as additional States came into the Union. Thus, for nearly a quarter of a century, this flag with its fifteen stars and stripes was the banner of our growing nation.


