Everything is still on track for **the stone bridge** in the center of Town to be replaced next year. Construction is to start March 1st and it will be closed to all traffic for 90 **!** days. Stay tuned for further updates."

Our **Beach Concerts** for the summer are well attended; however we are very short on donations to pay for the Concerts. We do not use tax dollars to pay for the bands; it is all through donations. The Town has asked the Department of Environmental Conservation to re-visit the Wilmington Wild Forest Unit Management Plan. This is the procedure needed to expand our trail system on state

lands. We have currently maxed out our mileage for the Flume and Hardy Road or Beaver Brook Trails. These trails have been a huge success; recently the APA visited the trails and observed the beauty and opportunity for the

community firsthand. While it is a public process and is certainly open for discussion, we are looking for a way to make a connection further into town, and also add some beginner mountain bike mileage to the Beaver Brook trails. We also continue to look for a connection through Indian Rock on private land to the trails (Beaver Brook) that about the development, allowing the connection from the Flume trails to be a fairly easy task. These trails are not just for mountain bikes; hiking, skiing and snowshoeing are also very popular. If you have spent any time on the trails you have seen that they are not damaged by the bikes. The soils actually hold up excellently to the use. These trails are something the Town can be proud of and can be a key to tourism growth. The Flume is one of few places that is handicapped accessible to the beaver pond where an abundance of wildlife can be seen. We will continue to

I want to give credit to Meg Parker, who has been the administrator of the Essex County Creating Healthy Places Grant program. The Town has received several items through this grant, including the liner for our skating rink, funding for the sign design, a bike trailer with a capacity of 20 for the Mt. Bike Shuttle, the Hardy Road signs, a canoe, 2 paddle boards, and 4 spring toys at our beach and town park. This program is promoting healthy outdoor activities,

The Town forces are continuing to work on areas for which we previously received **grant funding**. The Visitors Bureau area is finished with the exception of adding a table to the inside of the gazebo. We installed new fire pits, picnic tables and barbecues at the Beach. We will construct a

recreational path on the two acres the Town owns adjacent to the Beach and we will also construct a handicapped fishing deck next to the boat launch this fall. We are also going to add our homemade Adirondack lights to the four corners in front of Adirondack Chocolates. We are very fortunate to have such talented town

employees. ! "

The saga of the old gas station continues, we continue to try to get 7-11 Corp. to clean up the property with very limited success. We continue to cite them for violations and they fix some but not all items and drag the process out. It is quite a challenge when the huge corporation is in Texas, and attempting to force them to do something is quite frankly something that creates a great deal of stress. We hear about this building all the time and it is the biggest eyesore in Wilmington. 7-11 holds the lease until May 2015, we have not had much luck with the owners of the building either, other than they will sell it next year when the lease is finished."

something we all look forward to. !"

The last item is the Town continues to seek a **hamlet expansion** from the APA, funded through a NYS Dept. of State grant. At the same time, with DOS funding, we are performing a sewage treatment study focusing on the hamlet expansion area and the current motel area of Route 86. We are in no way looking for a conventional plant which is too expensive and fails and pollutes before it is paid off. How many of us remember our beach being closed due to the Lake Placid plant failure? We are looking at new, smarter technology with high tech systems that are non-centralized. We feel "

there could be a way to do this and not bankrupt the community and also be friendly to the environment. We have also looked into a possibility of a new hotel with a study to see if it is feasible. The study did come back that a new hotel would be profitable in Wilmington and would enhance the businesses that are here. Now some of you are probably thinking, wait a minute, we don't want this, we live here because it is quiet. I can assure you the current Town Board does not want to be another Lake Placid, but we need some new and refreshed growth to survive. I was born here and when I was a kid there were many, many more motels and businesses, campsites, diners and such. It was a really nice town then and I would be tickled pink if we could get back to that before I pass on. We can grow and be prosperous and not lose the reason we live here. That

is our vision. ! "

DOG CONTROL NEWS!

All dogs over four months old are required by law to be licensed and should wear their license tag for identification purposes. Licenses need to be renewed each year. Owners that have unlicensed dogs or dog licenses that have expired can expect to receive a summons to appear in court in violation of the town dog control ordinance which could result in fines and court fees. ! "

Also, a reminder that there is a leash law in Wilmington and it is a violation of the law for dogs to be running loose. Licensing may be done at the Town Clerk's Office at the Community Center from 7 a.m. to 12 noon. If you need a copy of the dog control ordinance, please feel free to contact me at 946-1282. PLEASE KEEP YOUR PET LEGAL AND SAFE BY GETTING THEM VACCINATED FOR RABIES AND KEEPING THEIR LICENSE UP TO DATE. The rabies clinic is usually held in July. We had a very good turnout this year. Thank you to those who attended and are obeying the law by licensing your dogs."

Francis Betters Memorial Statue Project

Friends of Francis Betters are raising funds to commission a life-size bronze statue to be placed in Wilmington, to honor and memorialize the West Branch Au Sable River fly fishing legend. To date we have raised over \$3000 towards our goal."



Fran was born in Wilmington, NY, in 1931 and lived to be 78. He began fishing as a young boy and never stopped. He said his father was the best fisherman he ever knew and that he taught him most of what he knew about fishing and the outdoors.

Fran wrote about fishing, was an expert fly-tyer, and was known for developing specialized local fly patterns such as the Haystack, Usual, Bomber and Au Sable Wulff. Fran built rods, too. He was an authentic Adirondack character and loved to tell stories, sharing his knowledge and great sense of humor. Fran especially loved the

West Branch AuSable River and its fast, challenging waters."

Fran owned and operated the Adirondack Sport Shop in Wilmington for almost 50 years and was inducted into the Catskill Fly Fishing Center and **!** Museum Hall of Fame in 2008."

The Mountain Greenhouse Project!



A fear for many parents is that their children have become disconnected. In the "selfie-obsessed" world, how many of today's children do not know what has gone into the production of their food? How far has that food traveled to its final end, the dinner table? How can we help families in our community with fresh produce? The Farm to Family concept is missing from children's lives even in our wilderness home in the Adirondacks.

We have begun a project that we hope will GROW **!** (*no pun intended!*). "

First, a big thank you to Brett Lawrence for starting her senior project during the summer. Brett's project is based on one idea: how can we, in a northern climate, produce healthy, natural vegetables year round on a budget! Her hope is to have a positive and lasting effect on our community, and to bring knowledge and a means to provide fresh produce to low income families through our local food pantries. We were looking for a greenhouse that could be in production year round, still have the spirit of DIY and fit in a budget of

\$300. The solution: Walipini or "place of warmth".



A walipini is a partially underground greenhouse. They were pioneered about twenty years ago in South America, and were designed to enable families to increase their food security. They are also known as pit greenhouses, and pankar-huyu, depending on where they are being built. Even in harsh mountainous climates in Bolivia, food can be grown year round in the "place of warmth". Walipinis gain and hold their heat for free via solar radiation, high thermal mass, and the heat of the earth. When it is up and running, even the micro-organisms in the soil generate much-needed heat. When there is snow above, under the frost line things are nice and toasty. Six to eight feet underground the temperature is a constant

balmy 55 F degrees (13 C) from the heat of the earth alone. A small walipini can be dug by two people over two days, with the roof and covering taking another two or more, depending on how elaborate a structure is built. Underground greenhouses can vary from low tech and low cost, to fairly hightech and pricier. Either way you go, this is a method that can extend the growing season and therefore our food security and self! -reliance, even in the far north."

Brett has applied and received a mini-grant from the CYC for \$300, our estimated cost to build the walipini. In the spring of 2015, The Mountain Greenhouse will be the new location for a farmers' market to GROW in Wilmington! Also a butterfly exhibit will be planned for the greenhouses first spring as well as a children's gardening program. Our hope is that construction will begin mid to late August and will be completed before winter descends upon us. There will be many group activity and work days for this project and all are welcome to attend. If there are any senior students out there looking to finish their thirty hours of community service, there will be some great opportunities coming up to put some time in on the project. "

Investing in the Future, Preserving the Past " In January 2014, the Wilmington Historical Society opened an "Acorn Account" with the Adirondack Foundation, formerly the Adirondack Community Trust, in order to better plan for our future and to sustain our organization in perpetuity. The Adirondack Foundation is an endowment fund which helps local non-profit organizations to build long-term philanthropic support through charitable giving. The Wilmington Historical

OUR CEMETERIES "

One of our Wilmington Historical Society members, Guy Stephenson, serves as the historical society's representative on the Wilmington Cemetery Committee. The Town of Wilmington has limited"

funds dedicated annually to making cemetery repairs. The WHS has also committed to repairing and conserving one or two cemetery stones per year. One of the stones we had repaired recently was that of Stephen Partridge, one of the first soldiers killed in the line of duty a few days prior to the Battle of Plattsburgh in the War of 1812. We are making a friendly appeal to each family with members buried in Wilmington's cemeteries to examine their family's cemetery markers for any condition issues. We respectfully

ask that you please consider cleaning and/or having your family stones repaired or reset if necessary. Thank you for honoring our Wilmington ancestors in that way."

Website Once again, we thank our webmaster, Patrick McIntyre, for maintaining our website. Through Google Analytics, which collects all sorts of traffic information regarding our website usage, we know that our website traffic is up from the previous year. From January 1, 2013 to December 31, 2013, the total number of visitors was 2,813 with 2,438 being unique visitors. A Note from our Planning and Zoning Boards

Recently, the Zoning Board has had several applications for variances, and has held public hearings, for fences, because property owners have not applied for permits and have erected fences that do not meet our zoning ordinance requirements."

Our zoning ordinances require that a permit be obtained from our Code Enforcement Officer, Bob Guynup, for installation of fences. There are regulations regarding height, and placement of fences. Following this procedure avoids your attendance at Zoning Board meetings/Public Hearings, additional paperwork, and possible removal of fences.
