

Miracles Still Happen! By Rev. Mark

I think there is this somewhat pervasive notion that miracles are things that happened in the Bible and no longer happen. I mean, you don't see anybody having folks open up a grave after someone has been buried for four days and then calling them back to life. No burning, talking bushes. No seas being parted. So, in that respect, I "get" why people would adhere to the "no miracle" thought.

And I can say, "But a new-born baby is a miracle", and people who are skeptics will smile, either condescendingly or patronizingly and say, "Yes, that is a beautiful thing!" Sunsets. The change of seasons. A flower opening in the Spring. "Sure, sure, sure, Pastor. Miracles. That's LOVELY!" But it seems as if miracles, for the most part, are relegated to the pages of "The Good Book" for a LOT of people.

But there are miracles still happening every day. Over the last 10 years or so, this church has done miraculous things. Or, I should more properly and accurately say that GOD has done some pretty miraculous things in, for and with this church in that time. Literally 100's of thousands of dollars has been spent...invested...in making the church-owned buildings more secure and better able to be used to their fullest for ministry.

In more recent years, we raised \$65,000 in about 3 weeks when our old handicapped-accessible church bus suddenly "gave up the ghost". We also raised tens of thousands of dollars to help fund an assist dog for a family in the congregation. We needed to carry out major renovations to the church organ (\$150,000 estimate, and NO...I am NOT exaggerating!), just to have no one who was capable of playing it. We raised \$11,000 in 2 weeks to get a Clavinova electronic organ/keyboard.

More recently, we undertook a Capital Campaign that, since October, has raised over \$150,000 for Phase One (new handicapped-accessible restroom-done), Phase Two (3 new roof-top air conditioner units- done) and a good running start at Phase 3 (new stained-glass windows in the sanctuary to replace the 100+ year-old one that are brittle, fragile and in constant danger of crumbling in the next strong wind. All of this in the past 12 years!

And that brings us to today. We suddenly had the opportunity to purchase a house and lot immediately adjacent to the church property. We are COMPLETELY landlocked and trying to make the best use we can of our facility as we continue to grow. We made a bold proposal to the congregation to vote to amend the bylaws of an Endowment Fund the church owns so that we could get a grant from that fund to buy the property with no pay-back. Then, two days before the vote, I got a text from a church leader that an anonymous donor from within the congregation had come forward to donate the ENTIRE purchase price of the property in question! That means that The Endowment Fund could keep their money and continue to use it to provide scholarships and fund start-up ministries! When that most recent news was announced to the congregation...there was an audible "gasp"!

The actual result of the all-church vote? It passed with a 99%+ yes vote! We witnessed nothing short of a miracle. We have been witnessing them for years here. The Bible says that we are trusted with a little. And if we do well with that, we are trusted with more. We are living that out day by day here, constantly trying to make adjustments in our approach just to keep up with what God is doing here! It is, in a word... miraculous!!

CURRENT/NEW SERMON SERIES

Much has been written about developing and practicing effective leadership skills. Books by Jim Collins, Stephen Covey, Dale Carnegie, Jack Welch and Lee Iacocca, to name just a few, have addressed this topic from several perspectives. Thousands of articles have also delved into this subject. But what IS leadership? And who does it apply to?

On Sunday, September 9th, we start a brand-new sermon series- Are You Leading or Taking a Walk? This series is NOT simply for "church leaders" but for...everyone. We are ALL called to be leaders- in our homes, our church, our community and the world. We are called to help lead by connecting people to Jesus Christ. This series will focus on the qualities of a good leader and the weeks of the remaining weeks of the series look like this:

Sunday October 7- Communication (Luke 6:12-16)

Great leaders don't have to be great speakers or exceptional writers. They need to be inspirational and persuasive.

(Proverbs 15:1-2, Colossians 4:5-6)

Sunday, October 14- <u>Team Building</u> (Luke 1-11)

Great leaders build teams. This requires, first and foremost, the ability to attract and retain top talent. (Proverbs 27:17, Matthew 18:19-20)

Then, our next sermon series will focus on **John's 3 Letters** found near the tail end of the New Testament. They are rarely read, rarely referenced, but have a lot packed into their short length. Three different letters, written at three different times, to three different people- yet they're all tied together by the same ideas. The weeks of the sermon look like this:

Sunday, October 21, 2018 Love and Hatred (1John 2:7-11) Everything old is new again. (Proverbs 8:12-13, 1Corinthians 16:13-14) Sunday, October 28, 2018 Water and Blood (1John 5:1-8) We are spiritual beings on an earthly journey. (Psalm 19:13-14, John 20:29) Sunday, November 4, 2018 The Lady and Her Children (2John 1:1-6) Children are a gift and should be treated as such. (Proverbs 22:5-6, Ephesians 6:1-4) Sunday, November 11, 2018 Don't Lose What You've Worked For (2John 20:29)

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

As you probably know, Phase 1 (accessible bathrooms) and Phase 2 (air conditioners for the education wing) have been completed. We are currently working on the design of the stained glass windows for the Sanctuary which is Phase 3. When all of the current pledges have been paid we will be approximately \$25,000 short of completing the windows. Phase 4 is the expansion of the choir loft and making it accessible. The dollar estimate for Phase 4 is \$35,000. To complete the last two phases we will need to raise \$60,000.
