#### 2013 Clansperson of the Year, James Blount MacLeod

Clansperson of the Year is the most prestigious award given by the Clan MacLeod USA. This award goes to a Clan MacLeod USA member who has contributed greatly to the goals of the Clan. The award was established in 1966, and there have only been about 40 recipients. This is an outstanding group of individuals, selected from the thousands of USA members who contribute to the success of our Society.

The recipient is selected yearly, through recommendations made by current members of the Clan Council and Past Presidents. Franklin Wyatt, as a member of the Nominations Committee and Awards Chairman, polls the Council to solicit nominations for "Clansperson of the Year." The results are announced at our annual general meeting.

James has given a great deal to CMSUSA over the years. He has invested his personal time and effort, and has been dedicated to not only the National Society but also to the Dunvegan Foundation and to MacLeod activities on an international level. He was most recently co-author, with Alexander C. McLeod, of an important article on MacLeod genealogy "Y-DNA Evidence for Norse Descent of Leod". The first part of this article was published in issue #116 of the Clan MacLeod Magazine.

James is greatly respected by all members, as well as other



organizations closely related to Clan MacLeod. He and his wife, Kathryn, along with other MacLeods, were recently recognized for support of the dancing and piping program at St. Thomas High School in Houston, TX. In addition to his work on the MacLeod DNA Project, James has positioned the finances of the Dunvegan Foundation for growth and stability for the future while

acting as its Treasurer.

The services and thoughtfulness that James Blount MacLeod exhibits at every opportunity embody everything represented by the Clansperson of the Year award.

Also recognized in San Antonio were the 2013 recipients of the President's Award, Ian Good and Tom McLeod. The President tries to honor individuals for their extraordinary work on on behalf of the Society. In the case of Ian Good, besides being dedicated to his RVP position in the Missouri Valley, Ian took on the added responsibly of revamping and continuing to update our Clan MacLeod USA web site. Tom Mcleod, who was recruited by Coralane Boyes years ago, has been a Commissioner in Kansas for well over a decade. He received the President's award for his dedicated efforts in that capacity.

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#### Raasay house reopens, overcoming many setbacks

The work to refurbish Raasay House was finally completed and a formal reopening celebration took place on 20 September 2013. It was well-covered in the press, and attended by Liberal Democratic British MP Rt. Hon Charles Kennedy. Chief John Macleod of the Macleods of Raasay is the patron of the Raasay House Community Company, which owns the building. Visiting Raasay and Raasay House is expected to be one of the high points of Parliament 2014.

You may recall that the building was the recipient of a number of grants, which allowed the entire building to be modernised and restored to use. Several small businesses, most notably the Raasay Outdoor Centre, operated out of the building and collectively employed quite a few residents on the island.

Tragically, right before that first restoration project was about to finish, the building was almost completely destroyed by fire in January 2009. Fortunately no one was seriously injured, and the project was well insured. There were further complications when the contractor, Rok, went "into administration" (bankruptcy) in November 2010. But the RHCC persevered, found another company to work with, Mansell Construction Services Ltd, and was able to get the project finished.

Raasay House is now a multi-function facility, offering accommodation from "lodge" style to luxury, serving meals, and operating a variety of recreational activities - inside and out, on land and on the water. They also support training and business meetings. The historic exterior of the building was preserved, and behind it you will now find a stunning interior. The original mansion was home to the Macleod chiefs of Raasay and was burned to the ground by Hanoverian soldiers in 1746 after the Battle of Culloden. The community had supported Bonnie Prince Charlie, who crossed briefly to Raasay while he was on the run. It was rebuilt in time to receive diarist James Boswell and essayist Samuel Johnson during their celebrated Tour of the Hebrides in 1773.

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

## The Stone of Destiny (2008 DVD)

The Stone of Destiny (Released by Infinity Entertainment, directed by Charles Martin Smith, running time 1hour, 36 minutes) is the dramatization of Ian Hamilton, QC's novel by the same name. On Christmas Eve in 1950, Ian was one of four Scottish university students who broke into Westminster Abby and removed the "Stone of Scone" from beneath the

Coronation Chair. This was a time of low public esteem for Scotland as a nation, but a resurgence had begun and had especially taken hold within the academic community. The students set out to help turn the political tide by returning the Stone of Scone to Scotland.

This stone was the stone upon which the kings and queens of Scotland traditionally sat when they were crowned. It had been stolen by Edward I in 1296, taken to London, and installed under the Coronation Chair of English monarchs. It is probably the most powerful symbol of Scotland's nationhood, and in 1996 it was put on permanent display alongside the Honor of Scotland at Edinburgh Castle.

With a great cast, this true story of passionate and determined young people – with no money, no experience as thieves, and barely a plan - entertains while expressing tremendous national pride. 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### Letters from Skye, by Jessica **Brockmole**

Communicated through letters, this is the tale of two women: a mother and her daughter. Although not typical of historical fiction, each woman cultivates a relationship during wartime. The mother, on the Isle of Skye, corresponds during WWI with a Chicagoan who is a fan of her poetry, while the daughter's life is related through what she writes to her fiancé, who is posted in France

during WWII. The author does an interesting job of weaving these two stories together.

Well written and intricately developed, you'll enjoy this heart warming, romantic story.

The Archive was set up in 1976 to find, protect and provide access to Scotland's moving image heritage. It has been part of the Collections Department at the National Library of Scotland since 1 April 2007. This particular film was sponsored by the Scotland and Skye Tourist Association, and runs for about 17 minutes. It follows "a hiker" through Skye, visiting Dunvegan Castle and climbing the Cuillin.

# Outlander, the TV series

Anticipated with great hope by Dorna Caskie



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Several years ago, my mother – who was not someone who spent any time thinking about Scotland at all - sent me some beat-up paperbacks she had been reading. They were the first in the "Outlander" series by Diana Gabaldon. I was hooked after only 100 pages, as what could be better than Scottish science fiction? But then I was crushed when the central figure, Claire Randall, acquired a gallant highlander as her boyfriend, Jamie MacKenzie. (MacLeods can be friendly with MacKenzies, right?) I feared the worst: that the book would degenerate into some kind of bodice-ripping romance novel. However, as the story has unfolded the books have delivered not only an intense and unusual romance between Claire and Jamie, but also magnificent historical detail and great characters (a few unbelievably evil ones), surrounded by a sometimes exhausting extended family saga. With time travel. To date, Ms. Gabaldon has sold over 25 million of her books, world-wide.

THE BIG NEWS IS that the USA television network "Starz" has licensed the "Outlander" series as its challenger to "Game of Thrones". It will be produced by "Battlestar Galactica" visionary Ron Moore, and filmed in Scotland. Choosing Scotland as a location was a real breakthrough as the film industry in Scotland has been held back for many years by the absence of a major production studio. As part of creating the series, Starz will construct such a facility in Cumbernauld (childhood home of long-suffering Scottish-American Craig Ferguson). From a business development point of view, this is a very significant investment in Scotland.

States Pipe Band Association and the United States Piping Foundation. He acted as its convenor or president for 50 years. He also received many honors internationally for his services to piping. Personally, he was a talented woodworker, a great storyteller, and a gifted singer.

As friend and collaborator Arthur McAra reminded us, "[He was] always looking for ways to encourage up-and-coming young pipers. In 1976, Maclean established the MacCrimmon Quaich competition for Grade I Amateur pipers, under the auspices of the Clan MacLeod Society USA, Inc. Today, a MacCrimmon Quaich Competition is held in each of the 13 Clan MacLeod Society regions of the United States."

He was born in Ullapool, north of Dunvegan, and after 33 missions with the Royal Air Force in WWII he pursued a career in forestry in Scotland. In 1956, he and his family emigrated to the United States. He helped found the festival that has grown to be the very successful Fairhill Scottish Games, in Fairhill, Delaware.


