CHANGE OF ATMOSPHERE

When I went to the doctor for a followup on my spine MRI and sciatica, he said, "The problem is gravity. The treatment is antigravity." So, I said, "Are you prescribing me a trip on SpaceX?" He meant an inversion table. However, sometimes a genuine change of atmosphere is beneficial for our health. I once found a copy of an old prescription for a trip to Arizona in the chart of a patient with asthma.

That got me thinking about my spiritual health. When we have a medical condition that causes us to be "laid up, so to speak, the Bible emphasizes that suffering and illness can be a profound

opportunity to draw closer to the Lord and learn from Him. My personal trainer, Carlos, once told me, "Remember, what you are going through right now does not define who you are; it's just where you are. It's like going from Richmond to California; you can't get there from here. You must have a layover."

So, we might consider those times of illness as layovers with the Lord. That is when we might consider asking the Lord what He is trying to teach us.

After the Israelites left Egypt in search of the Promised Land, they faced many challenges, including fiery serpents that would bite them, causing sickness and death. The Lord instructed Moses to create a bronze serpent, place it on a pole, and hold the pole with the bronze serpent high so that all could see it. If the Israelites were bitten by the fiery serpents and looked at the bronze fiery serpent on the pole, they would live. The Israelites had a layover, allowing them to grow their faith in God and their relationship with God.

God teaches us through suffering by using it as a tool for spiritual growth, character development, and drawing us closer to Him. Suffering can reveal our true selves, prompting us to confront areas needing refinement and to depend more fully on God. It can also cultivate compassion, strengthen our faith, and provide opportunities to comfort and encourage others.

So, remember the next time you are "laid up," it's just a change of atmosphere—a layover—and an opportunity to seek God's perspective.



Historical Trivia Did you know?

Hitler's own nephew enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1944 to fight against his uncle's regime. Serving in the Pacific, William Patrick Hitler was wounded and awarded a Purple Heart.

Adolf Hitler's nephew served in the US Navy in WWII. William P. Hitler was sworn in on March 6, 1944, and went on to serve for three years as a pharmacist's mate receiving a Purple Heart medal for a wound he suffered.

William Patrick Hitler was born March 12, 1911, in Liverpool, England. His father was Alois Hitler Jr., the half-brother of Adolf Hitler. Alois left his wife and son to travel Europe. He eventually moved to Germany, remarried (although he was still married), and started a new family.

When William turned 18, he traveled to Germany and reconnected with his father. His father took him to a Nazi rally where he saw his uncle Adolf, at the time, leader of the Nazi party. William again visited Germany and met his uncle in person.

Upon his return, William published some articles about his uncle. However, Adolf didn't like the way the articles portrayed him. Calling William to Berlin, Hitler ordered him to retract the articles.

The articles brought additional consequences. Now that his relationship was public, William became unwelcome in England and was fired from his job. He moved to Germany looking for employment. Adolf then denied they were relatives and shortly thereafter, William's father sent him back to England.

Again, in 1933 William returned to Germany looking for work. By this time, Adolf Hitler was Chancellor of Nazi Germany. This time Adolf received him calmly. William worked at a bank and later with a car manufacturer. Suddenly, his uncle revoked his work permit. Although he was eventually reinstated, his comings and goings were under scrutiny. After a frightening, angry meeting with Hitler, he decided to leave Germany.

Upon returning to England, William attempted to join the British armed forces but was rejected because of his direct relation to Adolf Hitler. William then moved to the United States where he went on a lecture tour sharing what he learned about his uncle and the Nazi regime. This was sponsored by William Randolph Hearst.

William tried to join the U.S. armed forces but once again, his family ties blocked the way. He then wrote directly to President Roosevelt, who passed the letter onto FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover. Upon review, he was allowed to join the armed services.

Sworn into the U.S. Navy on March 6, 1944, William Hitler went on to serve three years as a pharmacist's mate and received a Purple Heart for a wound he suffered. He was discharged in 1947.

William changed his last name to Stuart-Houston after leaving the service. He married, had four children, and ran a blood analysis lab. He died on July 14, 1987. His children did not produce any children of their own. (article source: Lyon Air Museum; photo: The History Page website).

National Museum of the U.S. Marine Corps Day Trip

A major factor in my personal decision to enlist in the Navy was everything I, Pat Robson, had heard about Marine Corps Boot Camp and the renowned Parris Island.

The transformation from civilian to one of our military's most competent warriors begins in Marine Boot Camp. The National Museum of the Marine Corps has an exhibit called, "Making Marines". Here's what they have to say about it:

Making Marines

All Marines remember their drill instructor. The Making Marines gallery allows visitors to step inside the process used by drill instructors to transform young men and women into Marines. Making Marines immerses visitors in the memorable experiences that forge recruits into privates and officer candidates into lieutenants: listening to the thoughts of wary recruits during that first bus ride to the training depot, standing on the famous yellow footprints, and visiting the barbershop where "it all gets taken away."

Visitors also get up close and personal with their own drill instructor and experience the most important lesson of boot camp: learning to solve problems as a cohesive unit, rather than as an individual.

Before you leave the gallery, try your marksmanship skills at the M-16 laser rifle range! Remember: "Every Marine is a rifleman."

If you dare, go through the experience. You won't be required to do pushups and you will be allowed to leave.

If you have not yet signed up for our day trip to the National Museum of the Marine Corps on Saturday, November 15, 2025, the sooner the better. Our 55-passenger charter bus has a wheelchair lift that requires 6 seats, which limits us to 49 passengers. Other organizations in addition to the Richmond Navy League have expressed an interest in this trip, so you should submit your registration soon. The registration form is below. The Norfolk-based Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer USS Gravely is heading to the waters off Venezuela, to support President Donald Trump's effort to combat drug cartels. Gravely and two other Aegis guided-missile destroyers, the USS Jason Dunham and the **USS Sampson**, are expected to arrive in the region soon, according to reporting by The Associated Press. The Associated Press, quoting a Defense Department source, whom it did not identify, and was not authorized to speak publicly about the planning, confirmed the ships' deployment to support counternarcotics operations. The official said the ships are expected to remain in the area for "several months."

Following the completion of a rigorous patrol, Northland has successfully returned to her home port in Portsmouth, VA. During the final weeks of her deployment, Northland played a critical role in a multinational interdiction operation, offloading contraband valued in excess of \$20 million during a scheduled port call in Miami. This action represents a tangible contribution to ongoing counter-narcotics efforts within the region and underscores the Coast Guard's commitment to disrupting illicit trafficking networks. A subsequent diplomatic engagement in the Bahamas facilitated the presentation of a Coast Guard commendation, fostering strengthened international partnerships. In addition to these operational successes, the crew also executed a comprehensive gunnery exercise, further validating their readiness to respond to a wide spectrum of maritime threats.

Beyond operational objectives, **Northland's** command prioritized crew morale through various activities, notably a swim call designed to mitigate the stresses inherent in maritime deployments. The conclusion of the transfer

season also saw the seamless integration of new personnel, while experienced members transitioned to new assignments within the Coast Guard, ensuring continuity of expertise and operational effectiveness. The culmination of the patrol cycle provides a period of well-deserved respite for the *Northland's* crew, facilitating critical familial reintegration and psychological recovery following a demanding deployment.

Looking forward to August, *Northland* will undergo a comprehensive maintenance cycle, addressing any emergent material deficiencies to ensure optimal mission readiness. Parallel to this, crew training initiatives will continue to be emphasized, reinforcing core competencies and preparing personnel for the diverse challenges inherent in Coast Guard operations.

Sustained operational readiness through continuous process improvement, remains **Northland's** top priority.



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
Important Events in Naval History:
