

Guest Column: Who Is "LifeLink 2"? by Ben Summer, Flight Paramedic/Base Lead

Life Link III is a critical care air ambulance service offering rotor and fixed wing transport throughout Minnesota and western Wisconsin. Life Link III has a fleet of 9 Agusta AW 119Kx Helicopters and 1 Pilatus PC-12 NG fixed wing. We operate 6 full time helicopter bases 24 hours a day in Alexandria, Blaine, Brainerd, Hibbing, and Willmar, Minnesota, and Rice Lake, Wisconsin, along with a 12 hour day base in Duluth/Cloquet. Our fixed wing aircraft is staffed 24 hours a day, primarily out of the Blaine / Anoka County Airport base. Life Link III is a consortium based program with 9 member/owner hospitals, those being Allina Health, Children's Hospitals of Minnesota, Fairview, Hennepin County Medical Center, Regions Hospital, CentraCare Health, St. Luke's Duluth, Essentia Health, and Sacred Heart Hospital Eau Claire, Wisconsin. We have been providing air transport for patients since 1985.

The flight team on board each Life Link III mission is comprised of a Pilot, Flight Paramedic, and Flight Nurse. Our pilots have a minimum requirement of 2000 hours prior to employment. The flight paramedic on board has years of prehospital critical care experience and all are required within 18 months of employment to obtain the FP-C (Flight Paramedic Certification.) The flight nurse brings an extensive in hospital intensive care background to the team, they also must obtain the CFRN (Certified Flight Registered Nurse) within 18 months of hire. Each base also has 2 A and P mechanics on call 24 hours a day, who keep our aircraft in tip top shape, ready to go at any time.

The Alexandria Life Link III base (Life Link 2) began in 2007. The full time staff at this base includes 5 nurses, 5 paramedics, 4 pilots, 2 mechanics, and 1 regional manager. We all rotate working days and nights, weekends and holidays, and are staffed 24 hours a day, working 12 hour shifts, 7-7. From the time a call comes into our dispatch center in Minneapolis, until the time we are off the ground in flight is between 7-10 minutes consistently. We fly all types of patients, from cardiac, trauma, stroke, OB, medical, adult, pediatric, and neonatal from hospitals, as well as landing directly on the scene to transport a critical patient to definitive care. We are extremely proud to be a part of the community in Alexandria. Please stop by the hangar (H2) anytime and check out the helicopter and talk with the crew. This is a great airport to fly out of and we are looking forward to warmer temperatures, and clear blue skies. Fly Safe!
