WHAT'S IN A NAME? BY DIANE I.

Dansville, New York bookseller and postcard publisher Hermon Wells De Long, 1851-1935, came to my attention through my hobby collecting vintage postcards. Alerted to the name De Long (my maiden one) by fellow collector Dede Horan, my curiosity was piqued.

I acquired a few of the postcards his Dansville Book Store published in the early 1900s - and wondered if his De Long kin were related to my De Long kin.

I hoped so, because later biographies would portray him as a man "possessed of many admirable traits of mind and character inherited from a long line of worthy ancestors."

Furthermore, he was "widely respected for his upright character, genial temperament and engaging social qualities." That's a De Long you want in your tribe.



Hermon De Long was a good-looking man with a steady gaze and strong jaw. Undoubtedly it was just my imagination, but I felt his photo bore some resemblance to my grandfather John De Long's younger photos.

H. W. De Long (b. 23 June 1851 in Honeoye Falls, Monroe Co., NY d. 23 July 1935 in Dansville, Livingston Co. NY) began his education in Dansville, where his parents had moved when he was four years old, receiving excellent instruction at the Dansville seminary. Because public secondary education was rare in those days, he continued his studies in 1868-1869 at Canandaigua Academy, a premier private high school in Canandaigua, NY, where Hermon no doubt boarded. (His father, George Wells De Long, was a successful Dansville manufacturer.) Hermon initially went into business, founding a successful druggist establishment in Dansville with a partner when he was just nineteen years old.

He possessed a love of literature and "general artistic tastes." In 1875, these inclinations led him, with great foresight, to embark in the book and stationery business, opening the successful Dansville Book Store - which over the years excelled in size and scope, much to the surprise of the initially-skeptical elders of Dansville. Stationery, office and school supplies, "fancy goods," books of every kind, and even sporting goods for younger patrons filled this beloved Dansville institution.




Hermon De Long also established a branch of the bookstore at the local Sanitorium. In the early 20th century, stationer De Long published picture postcards – views of local landmarks and byways, beautiful art cards, quality hand-painted Albertypes and fine cards printed in Germany. Some featured his own photography.

On the back was printed "Published by De Long's Book Store, Dansville, N.Y." or "Pub. By H. W. De Long, Book Seller, Dansville, N. Y." (I felt a certain kinship to see that he wrote De Long with the proper space, the way our family has long written it.)



From its opening on Main Street's newly-built Maxwell Block in 1875, the De Long Book Store produced an annual Holiday Greeting in the form of beautifully-rendered bookmarks, which I imagine were treasured by its customers. The "10th Annual" markers were dated 1884/5 and featured romantic rural scenes.

In June of 1902, bookseller De Long assumed the editorship of the local newspaper, The Dansville Breeze, also located in the Maxwell Block. He was a founding member of the men's Literary Club, a weekly gathering for debating current affairs. He made literary contributions to leading magazines.

In his 60s, De Long wrote a charming book, a short, illustrated collection of reminisces of his happy boyhood in Dansville, which was published in 1913.He facilitated Dansville's new Bell Telephone service.



Eventually, I solved the mystery of familial connection! I approached it from both ends, bouncing between the 17th and 19th centuries, searching internet genealogy sites from time to time over the course of a year.



I learned Hermon's father's name: **George Wells De Long**. I stumbled on someone in my early 18th century ancestral group (a brother of my ancestor) who had a grandson who married one Elizabeth Betsy Wells. Could that be the connection to Wells used as a middle name? I chanced on a Find-A-Grave memorial of George Wells De Long that mentioned his father was Orra De Long. Where had I seen that odd name Orra? The grandson! He had a son named Orra. Back to the 1800s I went... Yes, Orra's mother was Elizabeth Betsy Wells and the connection was made.

The link from our common immigrant 17th c. ancestor, **Arie Fransen De Langet** to Hermon Wells De Long begins with Arie De Langet's son Frans De Lange (b. 1681). Frans was a brother of my ancestor Jan Johannes De Lange. They all lived in New York's Hudson River Valley.



Frans De Lange and his wife Maritje named their firstborn son Arie De Lange after his grandfather.

Arie De Lange married Anna Wiltsie in 1734. Their eldest son was Lt. Francis De Long (1740-1820), who fought in the Revolutionary War.

Lt. Francis De Long married Elizabeth Betsy Wells, which initially tipped me off that they might be ancestors of stationer Hermon Wells De Long. The sixth of their ten children was **Orra De Long**.


Orra De Long's son was **George Wells De Long** (1818-1907) who moved to Dansville, NY in 1855 with his wife, his daughter and his four-year-old son, our hero, **Hermon Wells De Long** - who grew up to found De Long's Book Store and produce beautiful postcards.

Hermon Wells De Long lived almost his entire life in Dansville. He married and had two children.

Hermon died in Dansville at age 84 in 1935, having utilized his numerous talents to make lifelong contributions to his family and community and, unbeknownst to him, to a distant cousin who would find a lovely vintage De Long's Book Store postcard almost a century later.
