***Titans* by Leila Meachum**

Texas in the early 1900s was on the cusp of an oil boom and dramatic change. But the inhabitants still lived simply – traveling by horseback and unfamiliar with the telephone – and weren't expecting the economic growth that would soon be upon them. In the midst of all this upheaval, Samantha Gordon, the privileged heiress of the sprawling Las Tres Lomas cattle ranch near Fort Worth, meets the sweet-natured and charming north Texas farm boy Nathan Holloway. Their connection moves this narrative compulsively forward as they love, lose, betray and weather the storm of changes that come with to their state.

***The Road to Little Dribbling* by Bill Bryson**

Twenty years ago, Bill Bryson wrote *Notes from a Small Island*, a classic book that celebrates Great Britain. In *The Road to Little Dribbling*, Bryson sets out on another adventure around Britain to see what has changed in twenty years, and what has stayed the same. Following a route he dubs the "Bryson Line" from Bognor Regis in the south to Cape Wrath in the north, Bryson rediscovers the picturesque, eccentric and compelling country that has become his adopted homeland. With his renowned wit and humor, Bryson offers a perceptive insight into what makes Great Britain such a remarkable place.

The Play's the Thing in Jackson and Canton By Bill Semion

Here's a great nearby trip you can take in the next two months that combines multiple stops in Michigan's Rose City, Jackson, and in another closer by, Canton.

In July and August, both communities play host to the annual Michigan Shakespeare Festival at Jackson's Baughman Theatre, and at Canton's Village Theater playhouse off Cherry Hill Road. Jackson earned the Rose City nickname for its annual rose Rose Festival starting June 5. It's got others, too, including Jacktown, for its now-closed huge walled prison, as well as the state's first prison, built in the 1800s. You can also tour the original prison site and one of the cellblocks of what once was the world's largest walled prison. It also claims the birthplace of Lincoln's Republican party in 1854.

The festival that began in Jackson with outdoor performances now is the state's official festival featuring works by The Bard and others

When I lived in Canton, the Village Theater was looked upon with good reason as a white elephant that hosted only pre-teen ballet recitals and the like. Now, it's come into its own.

The festival begins in Jackson on July 7 with a preview—meaning a kind of practice performance prior to the real thing—comedy *As You Like it*, followed by a question and answer audience participation session. It's followed by a preview performance of *Richard II*, and *The Killer Angels*, the story of the Civil War battle of Gettysburg, which took place ironically on July 1-3, 1863. Ironically because we celebrate the independence and union of the entire nation on July 4, one day after the bloodiest battle ever fought on American soil. Tickets to these preview performances usually cost less. The official opening performances for all plays begin July 16 with *Richard II*.

Plays in Jackson take up the festival's first three weeks. Canton's plays begin on Week 4 with another preview of *As You Like It* on July 29, followed by a Q&A session. Canton restaurants include the excellent New Peking for Chinese, and

If you're headed to the Jackson venue, be sure to take in the city's other offerings. Jackson's famous Cascades have provided summer entertainment for thousands since opening in the early 20th century. The stair step waterfall lit in a rainbow of color at night is one of the largest of its type in the world and is a great spot. Civil War buffs will enjoy the annual August Civil War Muster held at the park. Top it off with dinner in town, and/or a visit to the The Parlour Dairy for great ice cream treats, or combine it with a visit 18 miles south to watch NASCAR divers run at Michigan International Speedway.

DOT'S RECIPE BOX By Dot Saunders—248-446-4005

Oreo Ice Cream Cake

Ingredients:

- ½ gallon vanilla ice cream
- 2 tubs 8 oz Cool Whip (use only 12 oz)
- 1 pkg. crushed Oreo cookies
- 1 jar hot fudge

Set ice cream out about 10 min. to soften. While ice cream softens, crush Oreos in zip lock bag.

Mix ice cream, cool whip and ¾ of the Oreos. In a 9x13 pan, place ½ mixture. Then drizzle hot fudge through the middle, reserving a small amount for the top. Weave through fudge with a knife. Layer on second half of the ice cream mixture. Top with rest of the Oreos. Drizzle remaining fudge on top. Freeze. Set out 10 min. before serving

To Take or Not to Take All the Goose Eggs... That is the Perplexion! By Denise Semion

A curious Colonial Acres resident called me recently to ask a question on the goose management program being conducted here: Why did the “goose busters” take all the eggs from the nest? Although the caller agreed that the geese population needed to be controlled, she was concerned about the nesting goose, which upon returning to her barren nest, began looking around the ground for the eggs, honking for some time. The caller wondered why our team took all the eggs; wouldn't it be better to leave one or two eggs so that the goose would not mourn her lost eggs and have the experience of raising one chick?

This is a great question, and so I contacted Julie Oakes, DNR Wildlife Biologist in southeast Michigan. Here is her response:

“Losing a nest is a totally natural phenomenon to geese. In the ‘true’ wild, they would lose their nests to predators, raccoons, skunks, coyotes, bears, you name it.

“In urban situations, there are no predators, so if you do nothing, the local urban population continues to increase and without hunting as an option, your goose population soon gets too large. Geese start nesting on rooftops and more inappropriate areas, and they can also become aggressive if their numbers are not controlled.

“By destroying the nest (removing all the eggs), we are trying to imitate a natural predation.

This then often triggers a response in the birds (you can help ensure this by using legal harassment techniques directly after destroying the nest) to do what's called the ‘molt migration,’ a migration in which young birds (not old enough to breed) and FAILED NESTERS migrate north up into James bay and spend the ENTIRE summer up in these northern areas, therefore leaving your lakes/ponds when you want to use them most.

“They will return in the fall (and migrate through open hunting seasons) and if they are successful, will nest again on your lake the following year.

“This is the ENTIRE reason this program is successful, because it encourages molt migration. By leaving an egg, you totally disrupt this natural process. In the wild, one egg would not be left!”

Oakes' reply helped me understand the nest destruction better, and I hope it answers questions for you, too.

I would like to thank the “goose busters” team for attending the training and removing eggs from nests, along with everyone who called me to report the location of nests. Claude Danielson reports that about 20 eggs were taken from three nests, which is a great start to managing our goose population before it gets any larger. We'll see how it goes in this, and upcoming, years.

What Strength Training Exercise Can Do For You

While high impact cardio exercise is good for your heart, it can wear away at your joints and muscles. If you only have time for one kind of exercise, pick up the weights. According to an article in Healthy Living Magazine, strength training specifically builds up your muscles with little impact on your joints. Your bones will get stronger as the body responds to the build up of muscle by producing new layers of bone tissue for reinforcement.

According to bornfitness.com, one pound of muscle burns 37.5 calories per day at rest while one pound of fat burns just two calories.

So if you are a couch potato—lift those weights!

You can also include Cardio and strength train at the same time. Lift moderate to heavy weights in rapid rhythm with short rest periods in between. The heavier weight and faster pace will get your heart pumping and give you those heart healthy benefits.

Working out with hand weights can strengthen the tendons that connect your muscles to your bones. All these parts will benefit and work together to make you more mobile as you age.

Boost your brain power

Exercise can slow the aging process not only physically, but mentally, too. In another recent study of Canadian women older than age 65, a link was found between physical exercise and the brain. Those who did regular aerobic exercise had better blood flow to the brain, which helps its ability to process information. In fact, the women who exercised scored 10 percent higher in brain function tests.

Keeping your brain fit with mental workouts also can help increase memory. So, challenge your brain by trying a new hobby or tackling a crossword puzzle, suggests the American Psychological Association. (as shown in the Health and Wellness portion of the United Health Care website.)

Did You Know...

Lifestyle physical activity, such as taking the stairs, gardening and walking instead of driving, is as effective as structured gym workouts in **improving fitness** (Journal of the American Medical Association.)




There is no charge for the concert and the community is welcome to attend. Paul and Esther Baxendale, summer residents of Colonial Acres are accompanying the choir across the state.

HISTORY IN YOUR BACKYARD

William H. Davenport House-300 E. Michigan, Saline
U.S. National Register of Historic Places



This handsome two-and-a-half story residence, constructed in 1875, was the home of William H. Davenport (1826 - 1909), prominent Saline citizen. Davenport was born in New York and moved to Saline with his parents in 1827. William attended Saline's first one-room log cabin schoolhouse. In 1851, Davenport entered into a partnership with H. J. Miller in a general store. He bought out Miller's interest in 1853 and became a leading city merchant. Later, Davenport started a private bank in 1885. Since 1902 this bank

has been known as the Citizens' Bank of Saline. Well-known Detroit architect William Scott designed Davenport's elegant Second Empire home, built at a cost of \$8,500.


