In 2022, The first quarter issue of *Hoosier Legionnaire*, published a cover story: "Monument in France dedicated to fallen Indiana Soldier". This month's program will feature how a family in Indiana discovered the final story of "Pvt. Robert J. Whalen, who was the only American soldier killed in action on August 29, 1944, during the liberation of Vailly-sur-Aisne in northern France." Our speaker will be Catherine Whalen Purdy, his niece. She will share her remarkable story of how, by chance, she uncovered a clue that led to the family's discovery of a monument in the small town of Vailly-sur-Aisne. In 2019, this town honored his sacrifice 75 years after his death. In 2021, the family made a pilgrimage to the town for a remembrance ceremony. April Dinner speakers will be David and Evan Humphrey. They will also honor a family member and WW2 veteran, the late Pvt. George Humphrey. Humphrey, recipient of numerous medals, served in the 36th Infantry Division in North Africa, Italy and France. WW 2 TRIVIA FOR March & April 2023

Inspired by Ozzie's earlier trivia reports . . . @ World War II Trivia: Richard Osborne,

Eighty Years ago! on March & April 1943 . . .

- March 5: The Allied strategic bombing campaign knows as the Battle of the Ruhr began with raid by RAF aircraft on the Krupp munitions factory at Essen, Germany.
- ♦ March 6: Major General George S. Patton, Jr. took command of the US Army II Corps—he was "recognized as the Army's foremost expert on tank fighting" and was soon promoted to lieutenant general.
- March 10: "Germany announced new rationing of nonessential goods, prohibiting the manufacture of suits, costumes, bath salts, and firecrackers, and restricting telephone use and photography." "New Suits, Firecrackers Are Banned in Germany", Milwaukee Journal, March 11, 1943, p2
- March 16: "Joseph Stalin sent a letter to President Roosevelt urging that a second front be opened in Europe. Stalin wrote, "The Soviet troops have fought strenuously all winter and are continuing to do so, while Hitler is taking important measures to rehabilitate and reinforce his Army for the spring and summer operations against the USSR; it is therefore particularly essential for us that the blow from the West no longer be delayed, that it be delivered this spring or early summer." WW2 Timelines. March 16: In the largest North Atlantic U-boat "wolf pack" attack of the war against Allied shipping, 22 merchant ships from Convoy HX 229 and Convoy SC 122 were sunk. One German U-boat was lost in the battle. [See WW2 Convoy-Web http://www.convoyweb.org.uk database]
- ♦ March 22: Deportation began of 4,000 Jews in Nazi-occupied France. The prisoners were sent by train from the Drancy internment camp, near Paris, to the Sobibor extermination camp in Poland, and 1,000 were sent two days later. All but 15 were sent to gas chambers upon their arrival, and only five of the 4,000 survived World War II. Gilbert, Martin (2002). The Routledge Atlas of the Holocaust. Routledge. p. 153
- March 29: Food rationing began in the United States following the March 12 announcement of limits on beef, pork, lamb and mutton, as well as butter, cheese and canned fish. Poultry was not affected by the order. Rationing of Meats Will Begin Mar. 29", Milwaukee Journal, March 12, 1943, p1
- ♦ April 14: The Commander of the 8th Japanese fleet broadcast a coded message concerning a tour of the fleet by the Naval Commander Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto to begin on April 18, probably in the high security code JN25 which Allied cryptanalysts had broken. - ♦ April 18: Japan's Admiral Yamamoto killed when Americans discover and shoot down his airplane. A late member of our WW2 Roundtable, Lt. Stuart R. Felton of the XIII "Jungle" Air Corps, remembers this event: "Our little tiny air force, the little old 13th did have some pilots that shot down the plane of Yamamoto, and when he was killed, they [the Japanese] lost some of their best brain power," and this was "a major psychological warfare victory." ◆ April 30: The British submarine HMS *Seraph* surfaced off of the coast of Spain, near Huelva, and dumped the body of "Major Martin" into the Mediterranean Sea as part of the Operation Mincemeat, to deceive German intelligence on plans for an Allied invasion of the continent.
