Update to the Shawnee Congregation – June 2, 2019

The following was presented at worship service on June 2, 2019 by Rev. Dr. Michael Drake, a member of the Lehigh Presbytery and the Lehigh Presbytery Administrative Council that has been working with Session since last fall.

Good morning! It's good to be with you this morning. I bring you greetings from Lehigh Presbytery, and am a retired pastor serving two roles for your congregation. One is as a liaison from the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry; the other is as a member of what's called an Administrative Commission of Presbytery, working with your Session in this time of transition.

I'd like to begin by asking you for a show of hands. How many of you are lifelong Presbyterians? Well, you're not unusual. Statistically speaking, about 2/3 of members of Presbyterian churches today had their roots in other religious traditions, or perhaps no tradition. I, myself, grew up as a Methodist, so I fit right in with you.

Because of that diversity, some of you may wonder what this "presbytery" thing is. You've heard about it, but what does it do? Well, the short answer is that, when you were founded as a Presbyterian congregation in the 1750s, your leaders covenanted that Shawnee Presbyterian would be a connectional church. Which means that you would not exist in isolation, but would be in partnership with other Presbyterian churches in the region, in the nation, and in the world. In terms of the region, the Presbytery is the entity, made up of clergy and elder representatives from the various churches, including Shawnee; and it guides those partnerships and relationships. It's a two-way street, where congregations and presbytery work together to support, encourage, and hold each other accountable, so that we minister together in faithfulness to our Reformed tradition. Of several Presbytery committees, the Committee on Ministry is the one that helps the churches particularly when it comes to pastors. We work with congregations as they seek a pastor, vet pastors being called to those congregations, provide for ordinations, installations, and so much more – the joyful aspects of ministry. But we're not a fair weather friend; we're there to help when a congregation faces challenging times as well.

You are facing one of those moments. Every church encounters them at some point in their history. In your case, in a period of just a few years, you had a pastor retire, then went through an interim period of searching for new leadership. That new person arrived, and neither you nor they expected that relationship to end so soon. But it did, and here you are back in another interim period.

That's not easy to navigate. So the Presbytery came to be present with you. There are several ways Administrative Commissions can function; the AC, as we call it, decided to take an accompanying role at this time. Beside myself, there are several other folks who are part of the Administrative Commission, including Rev. Betsy Baker-Smith here today, elder Sharon Laverdure from East Stroudsburg PC, and elder Bill Campbell from Pleasant Valley PC. All of them have experience with the various aspects of a period like this. We offer guidance and insight based on that experience, and bring a fresh set of eyes which can sometimes see needs and solutions which it's easy to overlook.

We've been meeting with your Session since the end of last year. In addition to the routine tasks, Session has been working hard to discern the path forward toward the vision God has for this body of faith. Thinking about things like: Who are you as a congregation? Who is God calling you to be? Where is God calling you to go? What issues need to be addressed?

They have decided that the best next step is to seek a Transitional Pastor. This is a role that is similar to an interim pastor, but the understanding and expectation on the part of both the Session and Transitional Pastor is that they will remain together for a period longer than the normal year or so a traditional interim would stay. This has several benefits. One is that it will provide you with a period of consistent presence of a pastoral leader who will lead worship, offer pastoral care, and participate in your fellowship and outreach. Another is that they are trained in the dynamics of a congregation experiencing change: looking at programs, stewardship, worship and finances; helping the Session affirm the ministries that make you vital to this community, and those which served you well in the past but perhaps need to be retired in favor of something new; listening for any feelings and concerns on your part that need to be brought into the light so that clarity and resolution can occur. Lastly, through all these things,

this person will be able to prepare you to be in a really good place as you look to welcome a permanent pastor.

The next step toward finding this person is to write what is called a Ministry Information Form. It provides significant detail on who you are and your approach to ministry. Session and the Committee on Ministry approve and file the form with the denominational offices, where matching takes place with those open to receiving a call to this kind of ministry. The Session has appointed a team of five folks to draft that form. They are: Deb Ballinger, Kathy Klinger, Kevin Mays, Chris McDannell and Gail Scott. They met last week, will meet again this week and in the weeks to come. They are working swiftly yet carefully to get this document ready. After that, we will be ready to receive information from candidates and determine those we would like to interview.

I know this is a lot of information to digest, and I have probably raised as many questions as I may have answered. I'll be around following worship if you'd like to speak with me. But I would also ask you to write down any questions you may have and hand them to Barb Dickinson or email them to her. It always seems that the question is the question of several. In this way, we can hopefully share some of the answers with all of you.

Thank you for the ministry you have had, the work you are doing in the present, and the work God is guiding you toward in the days ahead. Listening for the Spirit's presence, I believe the future is bright.

<u>UPDATE FROM</u> BUILDINGS & GROUNDS

Building and Grounds has been busy with both ongoing items as well as future plans.

Slow, steady progress is being made towards a permanent solution of the "crack" issue in the church. In March, we met with Ken Sandri, Preservation and Resource Manager at Grey Towers NHS, to evaluate areas underneath the church building and found evidence of graves. We were fortunate to have this visit followed by a visit from Dr. Shixiong Hu, Professor of Geography at East Stroudsburg University. He brought a ground penetrating radar unit and graduate students to our church in April. We are still awaiting the results of that study. Once we have the results, we will be able to proceed to the next steps of public notification and engineering studies which will allow SPC to determine and move forward with the best method to secure the foundation.

We continue with other, necessary projects such as monitoring and testing of the well water, monitoring the status of the Manse as well as continued evaluation of the viability of the Manse.

A new drain by the rear door of the CE building has been installed. Plans have been designed and will be presented to Session for additional drainage work across the parking area, along the back of the CE building and along the Manse side of the CE building.

We are also in the process of securing bids for replacement of the church carpeting.

Farming Tools... "Growing and harvesting a fruitful crop is possible only with the proper tools, such as shovels and machetes. This necessary equipment can help bring a fruitful yield from the land." Cost for six sets of farming tools of \$10 is \$60.

Family of Chickens... "Eggs for food, feathers for pillows and fertilizer for crops. By giving a family of chickens, you can help improve the food security and livelihoods of farmers and families around the world." Cost for five families of chickens at \$25.00 each is \$125.00.

A gift of a sack of Moringa seeds is enough to start a small nursery of these quickly-growing, drought-tolerant trees." Cost for two bags of seeds at \$40 each is \$80.

Rainwater Catchment System...

"Rainwater can be a precious resource when collected, stored and filtered properly. Help communities collect usable water for irrigation and washing with a rainwater catchment system." Cost of one system is \$75.
