Carrier Ford Accepted Into the Fleet

The Navy announced on June 1 that it has accepted its newest aircraft carrier, the Gerald R Ford, with a commissioning ceremony projected for some time in July.

The acceptance of Ford marks the beginning of the end of a very long road for the new carrier, which incorporates several new technologies including an electromagnetic launching system that will replace the old steam launch system, and a new arresting gear system, a high tech brake calibrated to the weight and design of each of the aircraft it's trapping.

The carrier successfully completed its acceptance trials May 26 after the U.S. Navy Board of Inspection and Survey completed its assessment of the ship. The Navy is still working out the kinks in

several new technologies, including the Electromagnetic Aircraft Launch System and the Advanced Arresting Gear, but the Navy has plenty of time to do that ahead of its first deployment, which is slated for 2022, according to Navy documents reviewed by Navy Times.

The ship will first have to go through fullship shock trials in 2019m which will test how the ship stands up to explosions near its hull. Those tests are complicated, take time to analyze and inevitably break stuff on board.

Ford is the first of a new class of carrier that will ultimately include CVN-79, the John F Kennedy, which is about 28% complete and slated to join the fleet in 2021, and CVN-80, the Enterprise.

My Dad, William Fred Haithcox aboard the USS Craven, May 1944. Middle is Wally Larson, on right is Leo Cunningham. I would love to find descendants of either of these two guys. I understand that Walley was from Whitefish, Montana. They were on the USS Lexington, flew an Avenger Torpedo plane. Here is the story as told by my Dad and somewhat documented in his flight journal...

On a previous mission, their plane was shot up. When they landed on the carrier, it went in to be repaired. The next mission came up and all planes took off except them. The mechanics came up and said "hey. your plane is ready" They said, "well we got nothing else to do lets go". So they took off. The plane left the end of the carrier runway and went straight into the Pacific ocean...with the carrier continuing on out to sea. The destroyer USS Craven was assigned to protect the carrier and when they crashed, started looking for them. They were all 3 able to get out of the plane before it sunk and with waves as tall as buildings began waving for the destroyer to see them. The destroyer only was going to make 3 passes...they couldn't risk the safety of the carrier for only 3 dipshit airmen that couldn't fly their plane... On the last pass they were spotted and picked up.


Looking for..... What?




A.O.R. - Area of Responsibility

Big changes planned for the USS Lexington Scholarship Award Program

After the Pigeon Forge reunion a committee was formed to review, enhance and expand the USS Lexington Scholarship Award Program. The committee has incorporated several potential changes to the Program that will increase the number of scholarships, open the Program to a broader set of students and make it possible for one term enlistment veterans to apply. All enhancements to the Program will be reviewed with the membership at the Minneapolis meeting and a motion to adopt the new Program will be made. If passed the new Program will become effective in 2018.

For 2017 the current scholarship program remains in place and the form is included in this Sunrise Press. Please review and if you have a family member that meets the criteria please have them submit an application as the Association would very much like to support their educational endeavors.

Proposed changes to 2018 USS Lexington Scholarship Award Program

Scholarship to now be available to High School seniors who plan to attend a technical school in addition to those planning to attend a college. Applicants are eligible to apply for the scholarship up to the age of 25. Note: This allows one enlistment veterans to apply. Scholarship is now available to first and second year (underclassmen) currently attending a college or technical school.

Two \$500 scholarship awards are now available, in addition to the \$1,000 award, to the first and second runners up as judged by the award committee.

The essay, of 500 words or less, as described in the application form, should also include a paragraph about the applicant's educational or personal goals and any other pertinent information the applicant wishes to share with the award committee.

Richard, (my husband), never really talked a lot about his time in Viet Nam, other than he had been shot by a sniper. However, he had a rather grainy, 8 x 10 black and white photo he had taken at a USO show of Ann Margret with Bob Hope in the background that was one of his treasures.

A few years ago, Ann Margaret was doing a book signing at a local bookstore. Richard wanted to see if he could get her to Sign the treasured photo so he arrived at the bookstore at 12 o'clock for the 7:30 signing.

When I got there after work, the line went all the way around the bookstore, circled the parking lot, and disappeared behind a parking garage. Before her appearance, bookstore employees announced that she would sign only her book and no memorabilia would be permitted.





Richard was disappointed, but wanted to show her the photo and let her know how much those shows meant to lonely GI's so far from home.. Ann Margaret came out looking as beautiful as ever and, as second in line, it was soon Richard's turn.

He presented the book for her signature and then took out the photo. When he did, there were many shouts from the employees that she would not sign it. Richard said, "I understand. I just wanted her to see it."

She took one look at the photo, tears welled up in her eyes and she said, "This is one of my gentlemen from Viet Nam and I most certainly will sign his photo. I know what these men did for their country and I always have time for 'my gentlemen."

With that, she pulled Richard across the table and planted a big kiss on him. She then made quite a to-do about the bravery of the young men she met over the years, how much she admired them, and how much she appreciated them. There weren't too many dry eyes among those close enough to hear. She then posed for pictures and acted as if he were the only one there.

Later at dinner, Richard was very quiet. When I asked if he'd like to talk about it, my big, strong husband broke down in tears.. "That's the first time

anyone ever thanked me for my time in the Army," he said.

That night was a turning point for him. He walked a little straighter and, for the first time in years, was proud to have been a Vet. I'll never forget Ann Margret for her graciousness and how much that small act of kindness meant to my husband.

I now make it a point to say 'Thank you' to every person I come across who served in our Armed Forces. Freedom does not come cheap and I am grateful for all those who have served their country.




