Also that day, I will be hosting a Via de Cristo team planning meeting, in preparation for a retreat in mid February. If you have ever wanted to spend 3.5 days immersed in God's grace, come and talk to me about Via de Cristo (the Way of Christ).

We will have our annual Christmas dinner and I am sure there will be more about that in this newsletter.

Christmas day is a Sunday this year and we will gather for worship on that day. We plan to do one service at 10 am. It will be an abbreviated communion service and I would suggest that we come as we are. Pajamas and robe is okay, or comfy Christmas duds. We will sing a couple of carols, confess, receive forgiveness, and partake of communion.

New Years day will also be one service of lessons and carols with communion at 10 am.

Christmas Eve will be our regular three services: 4 pm a children's shortened service, 7 pm with lots of music, and 10 pm.

From the Vicar...

The Reign of Christ is quickly approaching, and the Church's annual cycle will begin anew. I am a church nerd, and so I tend to organize my life by the Church's seasons instead of the Gregorian calendar. This means that as November 20th draws near, I find myself doing a lot of end-of-the-year reflection.

In **Advent**, I pondered sin and hope. I read *Advent: The Once and Future Coming of Jesus Christ* by Episcopal priest Fleming Rutledge. Her collection

of sermons spoke to me as I navigated my dear friend's illness and took a crash course in cholangiocarcinoma. "Advent is not for the faint of heart," Rutledge says. I kept vigil with my homemade wreath, watching the light grow as nights lengthened. How did Advent candles warm you during this season?

I celebrated **Christmas** with a congregation founded in 1762. I told them that under no circumstances were we going to burn down the building while I was their supply preacher. We laughed, and sang carols, and I actually preached on the lesson for Christmas 1, which never happens. I made cinnamon and orange ornaments for my tree, so that my apartment smelled like my mother's Christmas tea for the twelve days of Christmas. What celebrations did you enjoy?

At **Epiphany**, I did not chalk my door, because my friend was sick. The season after Epiphany the Church began reading about discipleship. I designed and began an independent study about how the Church defines "human," and what implications that definition has for the care for and inclusion of persons with dementia within the congregation. I grappled with questions about sin and empathy, about terms like "inhuman" and "dehumanizing," and what it means to be made in God's image. How do you see God shaping you into God's image?

I don't remember much about **Lent**, except that on March 22nd I discovered that I would be your intern. It was a lovely evening with many friends and good food, and a giant packet of information all about you all! What surprises did you enjoy?

Easter and the season thereafter were a blur of pulpit supply, work, school, and taking care of my friend. I anticipated graduation, and moving, and summer employment. I preached on Easter Sunday for a tiny, 110-year-old congregation in rural South Carolina. They had five people. It was a huge crowd for them – they usually have two. Preaching on Easter was another first for me, and the small group was so happy to have someone with them. Who received you with joy this season?

Then came **Pentecost** and the Ordinary Time of discipleship training. I spent a week in Alabama at my synod's camp for young people grades 6 through second year out of high school. I taught first- and second-year college students about how to lead small groups. I sat with them as they wept for friends lost by suicide, for eating disorders and anxiety disorders that they are just figuring out how to manage, and for the shame they feel for never being good enough. It was holy and heartbreaking work to accompany these young people, some of whom I've known since their

middle school years. How does your discipleship journey intersect with and advocate for vulnerable populations?

I joined you in August, and we've been walking this discipleship journey together ever since. My friend died in September, and my last act for her was planning her funeral and giving her eulogy. I walked her home, then I came back to you. I am learning your stories, individually and as a community. I am growing into my identity as your vicar. I am watching you all wrestle with important and challenging questions, again individually and as a community. As the Church year comes to a close, I am curious: how do you see yourselves growing in Christ?

Advent carries expectations for two events: as we wait for the birth of the babe in Bethlehem, we also await the time when Christ will come again to make a new heaven and new earth. Christ's coming brings peace

... but also disruption of the sin, injustice, and brokenness that burdens our lives and our world. When we pray for Christ to come, we are praying for a holy disruption of the status quo of death and the revealing of God's kingdom of life.

Led by the Duke Lutherans, our midweek Advent series this year is built around four steps to help us prepare for God's holy disruption: breathing, releasing, receiving, and rejoicing. Each week's liturgy (consisting of prayer and silence, singing, listening, and reflection) will focus on one step. Together, the steps will remind us that discipleship is always a process and journey. As we worship, we will ask the Holy Spirit to open our eyes so that we might see all of the ways that God promises to come and will come into the world.

Stir up your power, Lord Christ, and come!

Children learn through their play and they must learn to play. There is so much learning that takes place during sensory experiences by exploring textures, manipulating items and scents. When a child explores the world

through their senses, they develop fine motor skills, gross motor skills, language abilities and self-confidence. While sensory play definitely is based on the body's senses, there are also the vestibular and proprioception senses that provide input to a child.

The Advent Season is all about reflecting on how we can prepare our hearts and homes for Christ's birth in the world as it is today.






