Robert was digging out a very huge piece of chert to take home and Jim helped him move a larger chunk that was on top of the piece that Robert wanted.

After our lunch break we drove to a section of the mine where few people go to dig.

The Vulcan Mine is a beautiful area, so as I was digging, I also took landscape photos of the area. If you haven't been to the mine, you should try to make our December dig.




#### **Board of Directors Meeting**

Hey everyone. I hope you had a great time collecting at the Vulcan Mine. I was pleased to see Lauren Bell's crocodilian humerus that she found in October; what a great find.

From my last newsletter you know that Scott and I continued traveling on our 12 western states adventure. After leaving the fantastic Pueblo archeological sites in New Mexico, Scott and I settled in for some rest in Durango, as the next day we were to embark on another great adventure. Scott planned a trip for us on the 1881 period Durango to Silverton Railroad. This was one of the first railroads built in Colorado by the Denver and Rio Grand Railroad for the Old Hundred Gold Mine in Silverton. The mine was famous for both gold and silver. The silver found there was in abundance and contained in natural quartz mineral deposits. This ore also has lead as another principle element associated with it.

We arrived at the train depot early the next morning. I had no idea of what Scott had planned, but to my surprise he had us booked on the 1881 Pullman car with the 1881 sheriff, Robert Dwyer (a historical interactor). The sheriff narrated the history of the railroad, as the coal powered steam engine slowly pulled over 20 cars up the winding and torturous rail-

way, carved from precariously perched rock and cliffs. As we chugged upward, the sheriff allowed us to open the side windows on the cars for a better view and the open windows also allowed us to take our own photographic treasures, but it didn't help Scott's apprehension of heights. He and I took many pictures of gorges, rockslides, and avalanches (rocky and snowy debris).

We left Durango in a balmy 78 degrees, however as we climbed the 1806-foot incline it became increasing colder. Durango sits 6512 feet above sea level but Silverton sits at 9318 feet above sea level. We made several stops for hiking and camping enthusiast over half way up the forty-five mile stretch. All the mountaintops were cover in dense snow. In the forest-covered Animas Valley that we traversed, it was abundant with several herds of elk. They formed in groups of at least a half a dozen critters. Finally after two and a half hours we pulled into Silverton. Once we got off the train, we hiked a short distance to their local eatery to warm up. The temperature was a breezy and brisk 32 degrees, typical of their sub-arctic weather. I started breathing hard

and realized I was suffering from oxygen deprivation. Fortunately the dinners hot coffee and delicious food revived me while Scott explored the many shops in the historic down town district. As we walked around we noticed enterprising youngsters that were selling mineral specimens from the Silverton Mine. They were very reasonably priced, so I purchased a small Quartz specimen loaded with silver and lead ore. It made a nice keepsake from our trip. The silver that is mined here, is also associated with gold, and brought in thousands of miners in the 1870s and 1880s. Much of the silver producing mines in Colorado and Nevada helped to finance the United States into an industrial nation. If you ever get a chance to visit Colorado, its mineral collecting is internationally renowned. We boarded the train for the return trip back to Durango. Sheriff Dwyer decided to sit with us after noticing my well-worn old western fossil collecting hat. He said there must have to be a story behind it. We had a great conversation, and I told him about stores of the early dinosaur fossils found in Colorado. He said that my tales were more outrageous than his. We had a great time.

Once again we had another fantastic adventure. I hope everyone will have a fantastic Thanksgiving, and get out to collect.

See you all at our annual December gem show. Mark Moore and I will be next to the ticket sales table identifying minerals, fossils, and artifacts.

# Surreal Jagged Crystal Cave

There is an abandoned silver mine in Pulpí, Spain, where twenty years ago one of the largest known geodes was discovered. The volume inside of the geode measures 36 cubic feet (four feet in diameter), so once someone is inside, the sharply pointed crystals are precariously close.

According to the researchers, the geode's gypsum (selenite) crystals grew through a "self-feeding mechanism", due to a continuous supply of salt, provided by the dissolution of anhydrite (the anhydrous form of calcium sulphate).

This process, occurring at a temperature of about 20°C (68°F), was amplified by a thermodynamic phenomenon called Ostwald maturation (or Ostwald ripening), along with temperature oscillations that the geode was exposed to at its relatively shallow depth in the mine.

Due to the extreme purity of the crystals inside the geode – which are so perfectly clear you can see straight through them – it is difficult to date when they were formed.

They are probably younger than two million years, but older than 60,000 years, the age of the carbonate crust coating on one of the large gypsum crystals.

#### **New Business**

# **Club Receives Collection**

The Science Center of Pinellas County contacted us through our website, offering their entire rock, mineral, and fossil collection, with the stipulation that it be removed within two days, because the building was being sold. Peg and I took the van to Clearwater and removed 1041 pounds (I weighed them box by box) the first day. The next day I went back to the Science Center with a friend to remove the rest of the collection (698 pounds). Once all of the specimens were home, the boxes were spread out on the floor of our garage and the regular rocks of no interest or value were culled. The rest of the collection, varying in size from twenty pounds to pea size were put in boxes small enough to easily carry and store. I suspect the best of the specimens were gone before we arrived, but we still managed to bring back many very nice rocks, minerals, and fossils.

As I moved many of the rocks from huge tubs and overflowing boxes into smaller containers I was able to identify some, and some had been labeled and placed in plastic storage bags. Many I couldn't identify.

Here's a list of the rocks that I was able to identify or those that had been labeled:

Petrified wood (10 pound chunks), Many sea life fossils (dugong, whale, turtle, corals, etc.), Volcanic rocks, Obsidian, Salt (10 pound piece), Agates (some natural and some polished), Slabs of various types, Iron ores Native copper, Anthracite coal, Galena, Pyrite, Quartz geodes, Quartz crystals, calcite crystals, feldspar crystals, garnet crystals, kainite crystals, Schist, Gneiss, Coral, Agatized coral (one 20 pound chunk) and others, Tumbled rocks, Sandstone, Desert rose, Serpentine (large specimen), Chrysotile (asbestos), Sphalerite, Staurolite, Stibnite, Mammoth teeth. Fossil fern, Spear point end and arrowheads, American Indian pottery shards, Shark's tooth, Beryl crystals, Tourmaline crystals, Petoskey stone, Chalcopyrite, Copper slag, Kaolinite, Pectolite with calcite, Prehuite, Rhyolite, Smoky quartz, Blue quarts, Pyrite concretions, Tonolite, Pyrophyllite, Serpentine, Sodalite, Carrelian, Antigorite, Amazonite, Double flow obsidian, Dendrite, Opals (in matrix), Bismuthenite, Bismuth, Cuprite, Crinoids, Dumite, Zoisite, Talc, Gypsum, Columbite, Blue lace agate, Cerussite, Barite, Variscite, Fluorite, Marganite, Flint, Jade, Rhodonite, Actinolite, Vivianite in Talc, Ulexite, Muscovite, Biotite, Lepidolite, Coquina, Wavelite, Variscite, Sulfur, Agate geode, Fossil deer antlers, Pumice, Amethyst, Satin spar, Molybednite, Rose quartz, Citrine quartz, Pink marble.

After discussion, our club's board of directors decided to set up a table at our gem show and sell the rocks, minerals, and fossils from the collection. We will have the trailer on site and the specimens will be available starting on Thursday, December 5<sup>th</sup>, for members and vendors to purchase. Specimens that do not sell will be used at club meetings for door prizes, Chinese auctions, and give-aways.

#### **Dividers**



A set of dividers is a tool that I find very useful in laying out the geometry of a piece I'm making. It has two needle-like tips with an adjustment to set the distance between them.

Dividers can be used to transfer a measurement. Let's say you need a 7mm wide strip of sheet metal. Set the spacing between the divider tips to 7 mm on the ruler. Then lay the sheet on the bench, put one tip against the edge, and run the dividers down the edge scribing a line parallel to the edge.

Dividers can be used to mark equal segments of a line or arc. For instance, assume a line between A and B that might be straight or curved, and you want to divide it into 5 equal lengths. Set the dividers to an estimate of the distance. Starting at Point A, use the dividers to mark off five lengths along the line. If you end up short of Point B, lengthen the distance on the dividers. If you end up overshooting Point B, shorten the length of your dividers. After a few tries, the length on the dividers will be the exact distance you need to mark the 5 segments.

Dividers can let you quickly find the center of a circular disk. With one tip of the dividers at the edge of the disk, set the other tip to an estimate of where the center might be. Fix one tip of the dividers at the 3 o'clock position and scribe an arc with the other tip near the center. Do this again from the 6 o'clock, 9 o'clock, and 12 o'clock positions. The arcs at the center will form a small four -sided box, and the center of the box is at the center of the disk.

## **Vulcan Mine Field Trips**

The Vulcan mine in Brooksville is open for rock, mineral, and fossil clubs on the second Saturday of each month., Everyone is to be at the gate before 9:00 AM. Please make sure that you park off to the side of the road because of trucks entering and leaving the property. First we will go into the mine for a brief safety meeting. Then we have three hours to dig and collect specimens, or you can stay the full five hours. You can leave the mine either at noon or at 2:00 p.m. No one can leave the property before these times unless it's an emergency as a mine employee must escort us into and out of the mine.

Even during the winter months the temperature in the mine can reach 80 plus degrees with high humidity, so bring water, a hat, and sunscreen (also shade if you think you'll need it, because there is none in the mine). Sturdy shoes are helpful, also a rock hammer, chisel, eye protection, a bucket or another suitable container, and .newspaper to wrap delicate specimens.

No bathroom, no water, no shade, please be prepared and dress accordingly.

Children are welcome with proper adult supervision. This is a retired limestone pit. There are sharp rocks, wild animals, insects, and other hazards to be mindful of.


