Easter Reflection

We live in an age of anxiety. There are wars and rumors of wars. We tread carefully with even friends and neighbors for fear of being caught in the crossfire of the "culture wars". We are acutely aware of atrocities, famines and sorrows everywhere around the world. Our phones constantly message us with the latest headline of unspeakable human suffering. The sick systems of our culture malfunction and create distress in our hearts, mind, bone and sinew. Everyone, it seems is plagued with one malady or another. We cry out but the soil keeps losing nutrients, weapons of mass destruction keep piling up, the climate keeps getting more and more forbidding etc. etc. etc. It all feels utterly out of control. Like death itself.


Every generation has felt the despair of out-of-control sin and injustice. Every generation has felt the hopelessness and crisis of meaning that is the unfathomable mystery of our mortality. Fear of death being fear of the unknown which is so utterly beyond our control. "Is it all just a meaningless void" is the persistent question that echoes throughout the ages.

We dread meaninglessness yet often succumb to this "spirit of the age".

Embracing the cross, is to embrace the hope and meaning of the resurrection. Jesus prayed to let the 'cup pass from him", that he be spared the cross, but he accepted it and carried it anyway because his trust in God was greater than any fear. Greater than the fear of rejection; greater than the fear of being hated and despised; greater than the fear of failure; greater than the fear of pain and torture; greater than the fear of betrayal; greater than the fear of death. His trust in Gods love to overcome hatred, to overcome failure, to overcome pain and torture, to overcome betrayal, mockery and rejection, his trust in the power of Gods love to overcome fear and death made him fearless. Perfect love casts out fear. And this fearlessness inspired a fearlessness among his disciples that acted like a pebble in a pond: ripples of fearless love have pulsated throughout time and space and history transforming our world in marvelous mysterious ways that continue to this day. Ripples that to this day give oppressed people hope and provide purpose and meaning to people's lives as they abandon fear in favor of loving service. Released from preoccupation with the self they are free to connect with the entire sum of love throughout humanity, throughout creation, throughout all that is or ever truly was. This connection is a tremendous reservoir of healing holiness bringing about shalom, grace and peace even in the midst of humanity's darkest deeds. The cowardly disciples who betrayed Jesus initially turned into heroes of faith who fearlessly promoted an ethic of unconditional love. They saw in Jesus' death and ressurection the power of God and God's love to create anew, to restore, redeem, revitalize, and recreate so that God's realm, a realm where agape love would be written on everyone's heart and practiced perfectly, would be manifest on earth as it is in heaven.

Where O death is thy sting? Christ is risen, risen indeed. Perfect love has cast out fear. Blessings,
