STEVE LEFKOWITZ, LONG TIME MEMBER SIGRID NOACK

steve Lefkowitz had been physically active all his life, excelling at track & field, winning the NCAA Division championship at UCLA, winning doubles titles in volleyball and playing football. Steve also loved skiing.

After graduating from UCLA with a degree in Zoology, Steve worked as a Food & Drug Specialist with CA Dept of Health Services and started mountain climbing, In those days there were no "guided" climbs, so in essence YOU had to learn to climb the mountain. Nobody was there to tell you how and what to do. Steve worked on learning the ropes by climbing all over the western US and the big volcanoes in Mexico.

February 1980 was the big climb, the Argentine Andes, 22,838 feet above sea level. All was super fun, beautiful and challenging, Steve had spent years preparing for this climb. They were tenting at 18,600 feet ...until the 3rd morning, when Steve was found lifeless in his tent! Other climbers worked fast. An emergency helicopter could not land at this altitude. Total strangers risked their lives carrying Steve down to 15,000 feet, where a helicopter was able to pick him up and fly him to a hospital.

Luckily Steve survived, but he was brain-damaged by lack of oxygen. After one long year of medical treatment and rehab in Argentina and Los Angeles, Steve tried to adjust to his new life as a person with a disability. Steve speaks slowly, and can't walk without assistance.

Soon, The Unrecables (Unlimited Recreation Abilities) came into view for him. Steve attended meetings and then his first ski trip was in 1981 to



Snow Summit. Nobody could stop him now! Steve loved his speed on the mountain. Standing on a pair of slightly modified skis, he darted down Mountain High's difficult "Wyatt Earp" run--an icy, steep grade near the top of the mountain--without looking back.

"I ski better than I walk," Lefkowitz said during a break. "I don't need a lot of help, just a hand to get my skis back if they pop off. That's where having a guide, and the support of a group comes in handy." It's also nice to ski with a buddy.

Steve also started skiing with the Pierce College Ski Program lead by Lynne Haile. This program was unique for its low cost and accessibility. For \$20, disabled participants got a chartered bus ride, a lift ticket and the use of adaptive ski equipment. He skied with Pierce for many years, never missed a ski trip until the program ended.

In the years since then, Steve has been active with The Unrecables, participating in all the club's activities, skiing, kayaking, white water rafting, camping, wheelchair hiking, horseback riding, and more, in the last 45 years.

Steve also held many leadership jobs as vice president, LA Council rep, and club historian, but because of his longevity, he was familiar with almost every position and helped out where needed. Steve is still devoted to the wonderful Unrecables family by participating in meetings and writing historical articles for the newsletter.

Steve's most recent newsletter article announcing his retirement from his Historian position in the club:

Hello Unrecables Out There Everywhere, It is with much sadness that I announce that this might be my last column. It has been my pleasure to serve as your (our) Club's Historian. I know everyone always says that, but I really mean it. I have been lucky and have had a really long and prosperous skiing career, having skied every season since 1958 until last year. Even the year that I became disabled, I did a long road/ski trip in December, became disabled in a mountain climbing accident in South America in February, spent seven months in a couple of hospitals as an in-patient, five more as an out-patient, and then was back out on the slopes by the following February and March. The lure of the mountains, with their snow covered trees and hillsides was just too great an attraction for me to resist. It was a whole new ball game but when I say that this club, and adaptive sports inadaptive sports in general, played a HUGE role in my recovery and re-entry into society, I'm not understating it. I can also easily see how it's changed the lives of so many others who have participated in its programs. So, it's with some sadness that I say I'm entering a new chapter in my life.

My choice for my replacement, not to mention any names, but J. you know who you are, was the first Unrecable to have his kids in the program. This "new

blood" is what will sustain us so that we will still be there in the future to help other newly disabled people like I was in 1980. Unfortunately, he has other commitments that will prevent him from accepting the position.

To finish off my duties as your Historian, I was asked one final question. Are our newsletters given a numerical number so we can get a sense of our history? Not to my knowledge. They are presently delineated by spring, summer, fall, or winter, and then the year, not numbered so we could tell how many came before and our place in the scheme of things. Back in the day, the "newsletter" consisted of little more than sheets of the individual members' contact information so we could call one another after a snowfall to go skiing (I actually still have some of these if anyone's interested in seeing who were some of the original members). These lists were updated periodically but were not on a set schedule and consequently were not numbered. There was no original content in any of these info sheets. I'm not exactly sure when we transitioned from being strictly a contact info sheet to a ski club newsletter that contained Club information as well as general skiing info.

In closing (sniff, sniff), I'm not shutting any doors and will always be available should anyone have any questions about "the early years."

As usual, the offseason has been
flying by and be-

fore we know it, ski season will be here! Here are the dates for this coming season.

Dec 12-14, 2025 (volunteer training) January 23-25, 2026 February 20-22 March 20-22 April 17-19 May 15-17 June 5-7 (weather permitting)

The December trip is for volunteer training. For the remaining dates, volunteers have a reconnaissance day on the Friday of the weekend, student sessions will be Saturday all day and Sunday morning.

New this season is a condo rate reduction from \$90 to \$80 per night per person. (High schoolers or younger are \$25 per night per person). If you are as-

signed a couch or non-bed spot, the rate will be \$50 per night. If the master bedroom is requested as a single and granted, the rate will be \$110 per night. I am able to accept Venmo and Zelle (or Paypal through our website, but there will be an \$8 surcharge), and would appreciate payment in full if possible when committing to the trip by the deadline. If you cancel, and someone is able to fill the condo spot, we will waive the \$50 cancellation fee. Thank you for your understanding.

We are looking to get student and volunteer information forms as well as other forms set up so they can be completed online to further reduce the effort by participants. Keep an eye out for an email blast for those.

FALL PARTY! The potluck party is going to be at **Gordon's** place in Long Beach on Sunday, October 12th from 12:00 noon to 4:00pm. Mark your calendar and set your reminders. Refer to my email blast sent September 17th for the potluck sign up link.

TOP 10 OBSERVATIONS FOR FWSA STRATEGY DAVID TRAGETHON

I have summarized 10 key observations that have direct implications for FWSA's membership growth strategy, and might be of interest to snow sports clubs throughout the country.

- 1. Participation is at an all-time high: Over 30.2 million Americans participated in snow sports this season, showing strong momentum across the industry.
- 2. Alpine skiing is stable but not growing:

Growth is happening in snowboarding, snowshoeing, and cross-country skiing, indicating room to diversify FWSA trip programming.

3. High-income households dominate participation:

62% of downhill skiers and snowboarders earn \$100K+, supporting a focus on financially stable 45–65-year-olds for club recruitment.

4. The 25–44 age group is underrepresented in alpine skiing:

Reinforces our pivot to grow membership among 45–65-year-olds who are more engaged, available to travel, and financially capable.

5. Diversity is increasing—especially in snowboarding:

Black, Hispanic, and Asian participation continues to grow. Partnering with

more inclusive clubs can support broader outreach.

6. Female participation is rising in alternative snow sports:

Snowshoeing and snowboarding see strong growth among women. Womenfocused events and inclusive programming are key opportunities.

7. Youth retention is a challenge despite new participation gains:

First-time participation is up, but repeat engagement among youth is dropping. Gear exchanges and mentor programs could help.

8. Social connection remains a core motivator:

Adults over 35 consistently cite camaraderie and community as reasons they stay engaged, strengths FWSA clubs can leverage.

9. Urban and suburban audiences are fueling growth:

There's increasing participation from outside traditional mountain communities, opportunity for metro-area club development.

10. Climate impacts are shaping behavior:

Enthusiasts are more willing to travel in search of reliable snow. This aligns with our core offering of destination travel programs. •

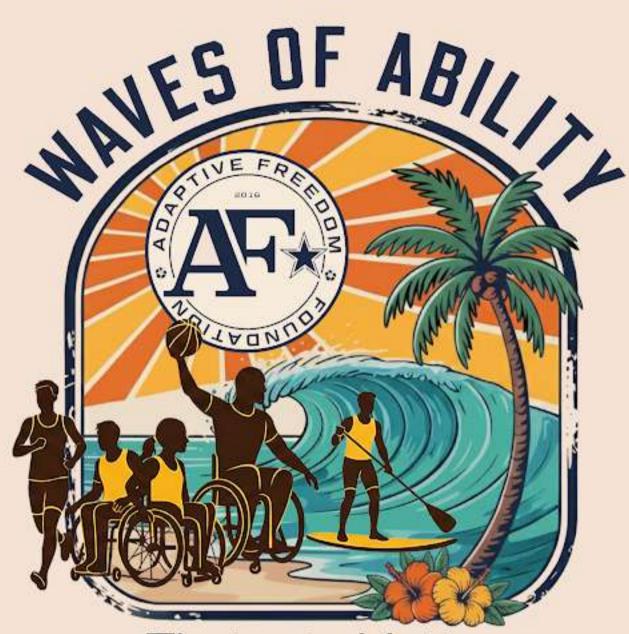
