*Silent Night, Holy Night
All is calm, all is bright*

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The lyrics to the well-known Hymn "Silent Night" were written by a young priest by the name of Joseph Mohr in 1816. The musical accompaniment was written by his parish Choir Director Franz Gruber. This hymn was first performed by Mohr and Gruber after midnight Mass, December 25, 1818.

In 1914 soldiers were having to spend Christmas Eve night on the battlefields of France during World War I. After only four months of fighting, more than a million men had already perished in the bloody conflict. On December 24, 1914, in the middle of a freezing battlefield in France, a miracle happened. Glowing trees appeared along the length of the German front. Henry Williamson, a young soldier with the London Regiment wrote in his diary: "From the German parapet, a rich baritone voice had begun to sing a song I remembered my German nurse singing to me.

*Silent Night Holy Night
All is calm All is quiet*

"They finished their carol and we thought that we ought to reply," another British soldier wrote, "So we sang "The First Noël" and when we finished, they all began clapping. And they struck up "O Tannebaum" and on it went... until we started up "O Come All Ye Faithful" [and] the Germans immediately joined in this was really a most extraordinary thing — two nations both singing the same carol in the middle of a war." It is recorded that enemy soldiers greeted each other in the no man's land that was a killing zone the day before. The soldiers wished each other Merry Christmas and agreed not to fire their rifles on Christmas Day. The spontaneous cease-fire eventually embraced much of a 500-mile stretch of the Western Front.

But the miracle of peace was temporary. Slowly, under threats from their officers, the troops returned to the trenches and the recoil of rifles split the temporary "Silent Night." Some soldiers admitted aiming so their bullets flew well above the heads of the "enemy."

As I reflect on this story, I cannot help but think of our world today. So many people endure the horrors of war—in the Middle East, Ukraine, Sudan, Central Africa, and beyond. Innocent children and the elderly suffer. Families are torn apart, and the most vulnerable bear the heaviest burdens. The need for peace is as urgent now as it was in 1914.

We need a miracle of a "Silent Night".

In 1914, on that battlefield in France, peace, however temporary, overcame war. It came spontaneously and unnegotiated. It came in song. It came because songs touched hearts. Peace came because of the One about whom the songs were sung – Jesus Christ, Prince of Peace.

This Christmas, let us do more than remember. Let us turn our hymns and carols into heartfelt prayers for peace. May our songs not be mere echoes of nostalgia, but fervent petitions for healing and reconciliation in our world.

Let us pray: "Silent night, Holy night" Amen.

May the peace of Christ fill your hearts and homes this Christmas and always.
