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



The Reading is from the Acts of the Holy Apostles Acts 1:1-12

The former account I made, O Theophilus, of all that Jesus began both to do and teach, until the day in which He was taken up, after He through the Holy Spirit had given commandments to the apostles whom He had chosen, to whom He also presented Himself alive after His suffering by many infallible proofs, being seen by them during forty days and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God. And being assembled together with them,

He commanded them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the Promise of the Father, "which," He said, "you have heard from Me; for John truly baptized with water, but you shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now." Therefore, when they had come together, they asked Him, saying, "Lord, will You at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" And He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has put in His own authority. But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." Now when He had spoken these things, while they watched, He was taken up, and a cloud received Him out of their sight. And while they looked steadfastly toward heaven as He went up, behold, two men stood by them in white apparel, who also said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will so come in like manner as you saw Him go into heaven." Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a Sabbath day's journey.

you see I have." When He had said this, He showed them His hands and His feet. But while they still did not believe for joy, and marveled, He said to them, "Have you any food here?"

So they gave Him a piece of a broiled fish and some honeycomb. And He took it and ate in their presence. Then He said to them, "These are the words which I spoke to you while I was still with you, that all things must be fulfilled which were written in the Law of Moses and the Prophets and the Psalms concerning Me." And He opened their understanding, that they might comprehend the Scriptures. Then He said to them, "Thus it is written, and thus it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead the third day, and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. And you are witnesses of these things. Behold, I send the Promise of My Father upon you; but tarry in the city of Jerusalem until you are endued with power from on high." And He led them out as far as Bethany, and He lifted up His hands and blessed them. Now it came to pass, while He blessed them, that He was parted from them and carried up into heaven. And they worshiped Him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and were continually in the temple praising and blessing God. Amen.

Reflection on the Ascension of Our Lord

The Ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ, celebrated 40 days after Pascha (Easter), is a moment of both mystery and glory. It marks the end of Jesus' earthly appearances after His Resurrection and the beginning of His exaltation at the right hand of the Father. But it is not an ending—it is a transformation of His presence among us.

When the disciples stood gazing into the sky as Jesus was taken up, they were filled with awe and perhaps confusion. Their beloved Teacher, who had conquered death, was now leaving them again. But this time, His departure came with a promise: "You will



receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you" (Acts 1:8). The Ascension was not abandonment—it was empowerment. It was the beginning of the Church's mission in the world.

The Lord did not ascend to leave us behind, but to lift us up with Him. As we sing in the Kontakion of the feast:

"You ascended in glory, O Christ our God, granting joy to Your disciples by the promise of the Holy Spirit; through the blessing they were assured, that You are the Son of God, the Redeemer of the world."

In His Ascension, Christ takes our humanity into heaven. He opens heaven to us—not just as a future hope, but as a present reality. We are invited to live now as citizens of heaven, even as we walk on earth. Our mission, like that of the apostles, is to witness His love, His truth, and His victory over death in the world.

The feast of the Ascension invites us to lift up our hearts—not to escape the world, but to engage it with the confidence that Christ reigns over all. It reminds us that the same Jesus who walked with the disciples walks with us still, though now in a deeper, spiritual way. And it urges us to live not as people of despair, but as those who have seen the Risen and Ascended Lord and are waiting for His glorious return.

HOW IS THE ASCENSION IMPORTANT TO US:

• The Ascension is the completion of Christ's salvific mission on earth

Just as the Resurrection is the victory over death, the Ascension is the enthronement of Christ in glory, affirming His divine nature and His triumph as the Messiah.

• Christ's Ascension is a pledge of our own exaltation

In taking our human nature into heaven, Christ shows us our destiny: to be raised with Him and share in the divine life. "Where the Head has gone, the Body hopes to follow."

• The Ascension marks the beginning of the Church's mission

With Christ no longer physically present, the disciples are commissioned to become His witnesses "to the ends of the earth." The Church is born not just at Pentecost, but in the commission of the Ascended Lord.

• He ascended, but He did not abandon

Christ promised: "I am with you always, even to the end of the age." His Ascension changes the mode of His presence—from the physical to the sacramental, from external to internal—especially through the Eucharist and the Holy Spirit.

• The Ascension prepares the way for the Holy Spirit

Jesus says, "It is to your advantage that I go away... if I do not go away, the Helper will not come to you" (John 16:7). The Ascension opens the way for Pentecost and the indwelling of the Spirit.

• Heaven is not a place "up there"—it is the fullness of communion with God

The image of Christ ascending "into the heavens" reminds us that heaven is not merely a location, but the condition of being fully united with the Father. Through Christ, that communion is now open to humanity.

• The Christian life is lived in a tension between heaven and earth

We are called to live with our hearts in heaven while still engaging faithfully in the mission of love and service on earth. As St. Paul says, "Set your minds on things above" (Col. 3:2).

• The Ascension is a call to hope and watchfulness

Just as the disciples were told, "This same Jesus... will come back" (Acts 1:11), we live in anticipation of His return—not in fear, but in joyful expectation, carrying out His will until that day.

• Through the Ascension, Christ becomes the Great High Priest forever

Having entered the heavenly sanctuary, Christ continually intercedes for us (Hebrews 7:25), offering not animal sacrifices, but His own eternal sacrifice and perfect love.

• The Ascension affirms the dignity of the human body and person

Christ did not discard His humanity—He glorified it. In a world that often devalues human life and dignity, the Ascension reminds us that every human person is called to divine communion.

Orthodox Christianity 101

THE EUCHARIST

The Eucharist (Greek *eucharistia*, 'thanksgiving'), or the sacrament of Holy Communion, is 'the sacrament of sacraments', 'the mystery of mysteries'. The Eucharist has a central significance in the life of the Church and of every Christian. It is not merely one of many sacred actions or 'a means of receiving grace': it is the very heart of the Church, her foundation, without which the existence of the Church cannot be imagined.



The sacrament of the Eucharist was instituted by Christ at the Last

Supper. The Last Supper of Christ with the disciples was, in its outward ritual, the traditional Jewish Paschal meal when the members of every family in Israel gathered to taste of the sacrificial lamb. This Supper was attended by Christ's disciples: not His relatives in the flesh, but that family which would later grow into the Church. Instead of the lamb, Jesus offered Himself as a sacrifice 'like that of a lamb without blemish or spot', 'He was destined before the foundation of the world' for the salvation of people (1 Peter 1:19-20). At the Last Supper Christ transformed the bread and wine into His Body and Blood, communicated the apostles and commanded them to celebrate this sacrament in remembrance of Him. After His death on the Cross and His Resurrection the disciples would gather on the first day of the week (the so called 'day of the sun', or Sunday) for the 'breaking of bread'.

Originally the Eucharist was a meal accompanied by readings from Scripture, a sermon and prayer. It would sometimes continue through the night. Gradually, as the Christian communities grew, the Eucharist was transformed from an evening supper to a divine service.

The most ancient elements that constitute the Eucharistic rite are the reading from Holy Scripture, prayers for all of the people, the kiss of peace, thanksgiving to the Father (to which the people reply 'Amen'), the fraction (breaking of bread), and Communion. In the early Church each community had its own Eucharist, but all of these elements were present in every eucharistic rite. The bishop's prayer was originally improvised, and only later were the eucharistic prayers written down. In the early Church a multitude of eucharistic rites were used: they were called 'Liturgies' (Greek leitourgia means 'common action', 'work', 'service').

The eucharistic offering has the sense of a sacrifice in which Christ Himself is 'the Offerer and the Offered, the Receiver and the Received'. Christ is the one true celebrant of the Eucharist: He is invisibly present in the church and acts through the priest. For Orthodox Christians the Eucharist is not merely a symbolic action performed in remembrance of the Mystical Supper; it is rather the Mystical Supper itself, renewed daily by Christ and continuing uninterruptedly in the Church from that Paschal night when Christ reclined at the table with His disciples. 'Of Thy Mystical Supper, O Son of God, accept me this day as a partaker', says the believer as he approaches Holy Communion.

The Orthodox Church believes that in the Eucharist the bread and wine become not only a symbol of Christ's presence, but the real Body and Blood of Christ. This belief has been held in the Christian Church from the very beginning. Christ Himself says: 'For My Flesh is food indeed, and My Blood is drink indeed. He who eats My Flesh and drinks My Blood abides in Me, and I in him' (John 6:55-56).

The union of the believer with Christ in the Eucharist is not symbolic and figurative, but genuine, real and integral. As Christ suffuses the bread and wine with Himself, filling them with His divine presence, so He enters into the human person, filling his flesh and blood with His life-giving presence and divine energy. In the Eucharist we become of the same body with Christ, Who enters us as He entered the womb of the Virgin Mary. Our flesh in the Eucharist receives a leaven of incorruption, it becomes deified, and when it dies and becomes subject to corruption, this leaven becomes the pledge of its future resurrection.

Because of the Eucharist's uniqueness the Church attaches to it a special significance in the cause of the salvation of humanity. Beyond the Eucharist there can be no salvation, no deification, no true life, no resurrection in eternity: 'Unless you eat the Flesh of the Son of man and drink His Blood, you have no life in you; he who eats My Flesh and drinks My Blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day' (John 6:53-54). Hence the church Fathers advise Christians never to decline the Eucharist and to take Communion as often as possible. 'Endeavour to gather more often for the Eucharist and the glorification of God', says St Ignatius of Antioch. The words from the Lord's prayer 'Give us this day our daily bread' (Matt.6:11) were sometimes interpreted as a call to daily reception of the Eucharist.

The Church reminds us that all those who approach Holy Communion must be ready to encounter Christ. Hence the necessity of proper preparation, which should not be limited to the reading of a certain number of prayers and abstinence from particular types of food. In the first instance readiness for Communion is conditioned by a pure conscience, the absence of enmity towards our neighbours or a grievance against anyone, by peace in our relationships with all people. Obstacles to Communion are particular grave sins committed by a person who should repent of them in confession.

The contrition that comes from a sense of one's own sinfulness is a necessary condition for Communion. This does not, however, prevent the Christian from receiving the Eucharist as a celebration of joy and thanksgiving. By its very nature the Eucharist is a solemn thanksgiving, fundamental to which is praise of God. Herein lies the paradox and mystery of the Eucharist: it has to be approached with both repentance and joy. With repentance from a sense of one's unworthiness, and with joy at the fact that the Lord in the Eucharist cleanses, sanctifies and deifies the human person, renders him worthy in spite of his unworthiness. In the Eucharist not only the bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ, but also the communicant himself is transformed from an old into a new person; he is freed from the burden of sin and illumined by divine light.

Statement of the Council of Bishops of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA On the Occasion of International Children's Day

June 1, 2025

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ,

On this International Children's Day, established in 1925 during the World Conference on the Well-being of Children in Geneva and later recognized in 1950 as a global day of advocacy for the youngest members of our human family, we - the Council of Bishops of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the United States of America - offer our prayerful reflections on the sacred duty to love, protect, and guide the children of our world.

International Children's Day emerged in the wake of a fractured world, one still recovering from war, division, and the collapse of families. It was born to protect the most vulnerable - our children - who suffer most silently when society fails. Today, its mission is as vital as ever.

Children are entrusted to us by God. Their eyes reflect hope, their hearts yearn for security, and their futures depend on the love and courage of those around them. Our Savior taught us this with clarity and compassion: "Let the little children come to Me, and do not forbid them; for of such is the Kingdom of Heaven" (Matthew 19:14).

We grieve for the children of Ukraine, who even now endure the horrors of war - displaced, orphaned, separated from loved ones, or forcibly taken from their homeland. We cry out for those whose lives have been torn apart, and we raise our prayers for those who live as refugees, clinging to hope in the embrace of strangers. These children are not statistics - they are living icons of the suffering Christ.

As a Church, we also lift up, with profound love, the children of the Ukrainian orphanages whom we have spiritually adopted and supported for over twenty-five years. Though the brutal war has kept us physically separated, our connection remains unbroken. Through the continued prayers of our faithful and the generosity of our communities, we support these children with material and financial aid. Special education teachers sponsored by the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA - remain with them, offering not only education but moments of comfort, dignity, and human connection amidst the sounds of sirens and scenes of devastation. This is the Church in action: presence in absence, love in hardship, and light in darkness.

We also extend our concern to the children here in the United States - children who face different, yet no less real, dangers. They grow up in a culture increasingly detached from spiritual truth, moral clarity, and the sanctity of life. Digital overload, broken homes, bullying, identity confusion, and the erosion of decency have become daily threats. Many are spiritually orphaned in a world that no longer teaches them to know God, to love their neighbor, or to cherish themselves as His creation.

We, the Body of Christ, must be vigilant. We must protect their innocence, defend their dignity, and guide them with the same love that Christ shows each of us. We must provide places of safety - homes, churches, and communities -where children feel loved, understood, and formed in truth. Their well-being is not only our calling - it is our responsibility.

To parents, educators, clergy, and caretakers - your work is sacred. To all faithful - your prayers matter. To our children - your lives are precious, and your future is worth every sacrifice.

Let us recommit ourselves to the holy task of raising children who will walk in truth and grace, who will stand against evil, and who will carry the light of Christ into a world in desperate need.

May the Lord, Who came into the world as a Child, bless and protect all children - those in war zones and those in our neighborhoods, those in orphanages and those within our parishes. And may we, as His Church, never cease to be a refuge of love, hope, and mercy for them.
